Northwest amateurs, professionals meet up

The top amateurs and professionals from around the Pacific Northwest will meet again this month on the golf course. The 67th Hudson Cup is set for Broadmoor Golf Club in Seattle and will feature the best amateur players against the top professionals from the

The event is patterned after the Ryder Cup with the two teams playing in foursome, four ball and singles matches. The event will take place Oct. 22-23 at Broadmoor.

The Hudson Cup is named after Robert Hudson, a Portland businessman who was a long-time member at Portland Golf Club and helped get the event on the ground.

WSGA sets dates, site for 2015 fall golf series

Tragic NW golf loss: Chamber's Bay Fay dies

The Pacific Northwest lost one of the nicest guys in the golf business when Jamie Fay died when a tree fell on his car.

Fay, the long-time marketing director at Chambers Bay and big-time supporter of golf in the Pacific Northwest, died when a tree hit his car while he was driving home from the store. His 3-year-old daughter in the back seat fortunately went unhurt in the tragic accident.

After attending and graduating from the University of Puget Sound in 2001 he went to work for KemperSports, working at Bandon Dunes Golf Resort. In June 2008, he left Bandon Dunes to take the position of Director of Sales and Marketing at Chambers Bay Golf Course, and in 2011 he was promoted to Assistant General Manager. Jamie leaves behind his wife Jen and two young daughters, Eilee and Elsie.





LPGA tournament puts Sahalee back in the national golf spotlight in 2016

Sahalee Country Club in Sammamish, Wash. is used to being in the golf spotlight. In recent years the club has hosted the PGA Championship, the NEC Invitational and the U.S. Senior Open. Now, the ladies get a turn at Sahalee.

Sahalee Country Club will host one of the LPGA major championships in 2016 with the KPMG Women's PGA Championship set for June 9-12 and featuring the best the LPGA Tour has to offer for four days.

The tournament had been known as the LPGA Championship through 2014 until the PGA of America got involved with the LPGA and decided to change the name, add money and put it squarely in the golf spotlight.

"One of the key pieces of our collaboration with KPMG and the PGA of America was the commitment to bringing this Championship to world-class venues, and Sahalee Country Club will provide a great major championship test for our players," LPGA Commissioner Mike Whan said. "The Pacific Northwest has always been a strong supporter of the LPGA and we are excited to bring the Tour back to Seattle for the first time since 1999."

The Seattle area had for years been home to the Safeco Classic at Meridian Valley Country Club in Kent. It was one of the most popular stops on the Tour until Safeco pulled the sponsorship from the tournament. The Portland area annually has an LPGA event in August.

Sean Riley, a PGA golf professional who grew up in southern Washington, has been named as the director for the tournament. Riley is no stranger to Sahalee having worked at the course as an intern in 2007. Riley also worked for the American Junior Golf Association establishing several significant events in Washington including the Ryan Moore Junior Championship at Oakbrook in Lakewood.

Sahalee President Steve Oaks said the club is excited about getting the tournament to the Seattle area in 2016.

"There is plenty of excitement at Sahalee to host a women's major championship," he said. "Our eight founders designed the course to host championships."

Back to the beach: World Amateur event in Myrtle Beach is a spectacle

It had been a few years since I had been to the Myrtle Beach World Amateur Handicap Championship. I had gone for years and had loved every minute of it. Besides, what was not to like about this week-long event. There were the four tournament rounds. The 19th hole party at the convention center with free food and yes, some free spirits and the chance to meet some other golfers from around the country.

The weather? OK maybe a little hot and humid and sticky, but for most of the golfers in the tournament no big deal. For those of us from the Pacific Northwest, always a little different but just remember to bring a change of shirts for the turn.

This is an event that not only feels like a professional tournament but this year was a tournament with nearly 3,400 players. It has an endless amount of flights for men, women and seniors. It seems that nearly every course on the Grant Strand (the name for the Myrtle Beach area) is used during the week and the post-round party at the convention center must be seen to be believed.

It is indeed golf nirvana.

The tournament has been a part of the Myrtle Beach golf landscape for over 30 years and the numbers are always big. Players come from across the country and from around the globe to take part. In fact, this year there were 207 international players and a total of 27 foreign countries represented at the tournament.

From the Pacific Northwest, we spent about five hours in the air to get there. One player spent a total of 10,512 miles to get there from a foreign country. Now that's golf dedication.

A few other tidbits: There were 48 of the 50 states represented at the tournament and there were four holes-in-one during the course of the tournament. More importantly, there were 18,480 beers consumed during the 19th hole.

Considering John Daly was hanging out for two nights at the Myrtle Beach Convention Center there was no doubt that alcohol was involved. In fact Daly was there to press the flesh and to promote his own brand of drinks called John Daly Cocktail, a vodka mixture that actually tastes pretty good and has a 17 percent alcohol content. By the way, after seeing Daly in person for the first time,



he is not nearly as tall as he seems on TV and fills out his golf shirt in a robust way.

If you are a golfer, Myrtle Beach needs to be on your bucket list. Myrtle Beach Golf Holiday, which runs the tournament, also puts on several other events during the course of the year that are worth the trip to the East Coast. Myrtle Beach might seem like a man's golf trip idea, but many people bring the family. There is plenty to do from lounging at the ocean, playing putt putt golf, driving go carts and other family activities.

But if you do decide this is a man's trip, there is plenty for you to see and do - from night clubs to shows to a variety of golf courses, it is truly a vacation friendly kind of place.

The World Amateur really lives up to its name. It's a tournament which has open arms for people from around the world. You might not play well, but after you shoot a 92 and the beverages are flowing at the Convention Center, you really don't care what you shoot.



When anchoring ban hits in 2016, Northwest duo has an answer for golfers looking for help

When the USGA and Royal and Ancient said there would be a ban on anchored putters in 2016, many golfers were left to figure out what to do. A couple of Northwest golfers just might have an idea for those in need.

Arm-Lock Golf co-owners Ronnie Espedal, Ocean Shores PGA professional, and Ed Klein, club member/stockbroker, started their putter grip company to solve the needs of anchored putter users facing the 2016 anchor ban.

Their arm-lock putter grip adds enough loft to convert any putter to an arm-lock putter. The arm-lock method, used by Matt Kuchar, will be legal after the 2016 ban. The original converter grip was chosen as the sixth best new product out of over 200 at the Orlando PGA Merchandise show in January. The first conforming putter

grips were available in June. The company progressed to a counterbalanced grip model and then to a modification to the originals with flat fronts and slightly smaller size.

Now Arm-Lock Golf is taking on the mainstream putter grip companies with new models designed to help all golfers putt better.

Now the choices include five models covering arm-lock, counterbalanced and traditional putter grips. More grips are currently under development. Espedal and Klein believe that the RX model and new RX LITE are the best putter grips made. Both grips feature a flat front, a tapered diameter and the best feel of any grips available. The grips have such a tacky surface that the grips can stick to each other, demonstrating the lighter grip pressure needed with the RX grips.

Light grip pressure leads to better feel and fewer putts. Arm-Lock's marketing is centered around golf pro shops and secondarily, large retailers. The golf professional's advice is very valuable, especially for players who use anchored putters. The company's goal is to make the full line of grips available in all pro shops and retailers.


Also of note is an effort to have their grips used on the PGA, Champions and LPGA tours. A tour representative is beginning to introduce grips to the PGA tour and contacts were recently made with top anchored putter users at the Boeing Classic.

Even Bandon was affected by Northwest fire danger; Mack Jr. wins Senior PGA

The wild fire broke out on the north end of the Bandon Dunes Golf Resort last month closed Old Macdonald and Pacific Dunes. The irrigation systems on both courses were partially activated to serve as protection.

Play on the resort's other courses – Bandon Dunes, Bandon Trails and the par-3 Bandon Preserve – continued. The fire was located north of the 16th fairway and green and 17th tee at Old Macdonald, with no damage to any golf course structures.

The original breakout seemed to most affect the Bally Bandon Sheep Ranch, a golf course that is just north of the Bandon Dunes Golf Resort and has no formal relationship with the resort.

Conditions in the region were unusually dry. Compounding the risk of fire is the ubiquity of non-native gorse in the area. Gorse was originally brought from Ireland in the 19th century to provide for shoreline erosion control. It has since spread up and down the adjoining Oregon coast without limitation by natural predators. The volatile plant is readily combustible. A gorse fire broke out on the construction site of Pacific Dunes in 1999.

Twice in the last century, in 1910 and again in 1936, the town of Bandon, six miles south of the resort, burned to the ground due to an uncontrolled gorse fore. Course managers at the 2,000-acre Bandon Dunes resort regularly undertakes an extensive gorse eradication program of acres of the plant.

Mack Jr. claims Senior PGA event

PGA Professional George Mack Jr. of Black Butte Ranch (Sisters, OR) won the Senior PGA Professional Championship by four strokes after rounds of 72-68-140 at The Home Course. In second place was PGA Professional Mark Keating of Pumpkin Ridge GC (North Plains, OR).

PGA Professional Jim Pike of Sahalee CC (Sammamish, WA) placed in lone third.

In addition to Mack Jr., Keating and Pike, Rob Gibbons of Arrowhead GC (Molalla, OR), Steve Stull of Meadow Springs CC (Kennewick, WA), Chuck Milne of Vanco Driving Range (Vancouver, WA), Steve Prugh of Manito G&CC (Spokane, WA) and Mark Gardner of The Creek at Qualchan (Spokane, WA) all earned spots and qualified for the 2015 Senior PGA Professional National Championship that will take place on October 15th-18th, 2015 on both the Bayonet and Black Horse Golf Courses in Seaside, CA.

Washington team 17th at USGA event

After chasing Florida since the first round, Georgia rallied to win its fourth USGA Women's State Team Championship, by three strokes, in the 11th edition of the biennial team championship conducted on the par-72, 6,203-yard Dalhousie Golf Club course in Cape Giradeau, Mo.

All three Georgia players – Lauren Lightfritz, Emilie Meason and Margaret Shirley – contributed to Georgia's winning 54-hole score of 4-over 436

The Washington team of Amanda Jacobs of Seattle, Leslie Folsom of Tukwila and Shawn Farmer Sese of Bellevue finished 17th with a 458 team score.

Canadian golfer wins PNGA Mid-Am

Brent Wilson of Cobble Hill, B.C. shot a final round 1-under-par 70 to come from behind and win the 31st Pacific Northwest Men's Mid-Amateur Championship.

The 54-hole stroke-play championship was held on the Valley Course at the Westin Bear Mountain Resort in Victoria, B.C., and was con-

ducted by the Pacific Northwest Golf Association (PNGA)

Wilson, 33, had started the day a shot behind co-leaders Erik Hanson of Kirkland, Wash. and Rob Olson of Victoria, B.C. With all three players paired together in the last group of the final round, Wilson had his work cut out for him, with Hanson already having won the 2015 Pacific Northwest Master-40 Championship, and Olson perhaps having an edge, being the current club champion at Bear Mountain.

Penner wins Tacoma Open crown

Kevin Penner of Sammamish won the Tacoma Open at Meadow Park Golf Course with a threeround total of 199. He beat out Christopher Evans who finished at 200.

Penner won a first-place check of \$10,000 for the win, which attracted some of the Pacific Northwest's touring professionals including Troy Kelly and Andres Gonzales.

Penner opened with rounds of 66 and 70 but came from behind with a 63 in the final round. Professionals and amateurs both competed.

Burkey-Smego team win PNGA event

Ginny Burkey of Eugene, Ore. successfully defended their title by winning the 33rd Pacific Northwest Women's Senior Team Championship. Smego and Burkey had paired together last year in winning the championship. They won by 16 strokes last year and 22 strokes this year.

The championship was held at Sunriver (Ore.) Resort, and was conducted by the Pacific Northwest Golf Association (PNGA).

Burkey has now won this event six times. She won four in a row with Loree McKay (2008-11), and then 2014 and 2015 with Smego. Smego has won three times now.



WinCo Foods Portland Open sends 25 players to PGA Tour

Veteran Web.com Tour player Dicky Pride, riding a late-season wave of momentum, carded a final round 4-under 67 to win the WinCo Foods Portland Open and earn his PGA Tour card for the 2015-16 season. Pride, who led by four shots entering the final round at the Witch Hollow course at Pumpkin Ridge, finished at 20-under 264, three strokes in front of four-time PGA Tour winner Tim "Lumpy" Herron (66) and four ahead of a late surging Tommy "Two Gloves" Gainey (65), also a former PGA Tour winner.

Pride's only other career title came in his rookie season on the PGA Tour at the 1994 FedEx St. Jude Classic.

Pride collected a check for \$144,000 in the Tour's final regular season event and vaulted from No. 40 to No. 5 on the Web.com Tour's money list. The Top-25 money winners earned 2015-2016 PGA Tour cards.

The WinCo Foods Portland Open was the final event of 21 regular season events on the 2015 Web.com Tour schedule. At the conclusion of play, the Top-25 money winners for the season were presented with their PGA Tour cards during a special ceremony on the 18th green at Witch Hollow. Just six weeks after the WinCo Foods Portland Open, these Web.com Tour graduates

will now be playing on golf's biggest stage beginning with the Frys.com Open Oct. 15-18.

Pride was not the only winner after a fantastic week at Pumpkin Ridge. The tournament announced that the event generated \$1,115,000 for local charities, the second-highest charitable outcome on the 2015 Web.com Tour.

Feenstra claims Pacific NW Championship

PGA Professional Tim Feenstra of Broadmoor GC (Seattle) came from five strokes behind PGA Professional Brian Thornton of Meridian Valley CC (Kent, Wash/) to win his third Pacific Northwest PGA Professional Championship in a playoff. Feenstra had six birdies on his way to his 6-under par 66 to force a playoff.

On the first hole of the playoff, Feenstra birdied to win after Thornton's birdie putt narrowly missed. Feenstra has previously won this event back in 2011 at Illahe Hills CC and 2013

at Meadow Springs CC. PGA Professional Clint Ables of Wildhorse Resort GC (Pentleton, OR) and PGA Professional Brian Nosler of Golf in the Pearl (Portland, OR) finished in a tie for third place. Tim Feenstra, Brian Thornton, Clint Ables, Brian Nosler, Tony Robydek, Jason Aichele, Ryan Malby and Jason Pitt all earned a spot and advanced directly to the PGA Professional Championship, June 26-June 29th, 2016, at Turning Stone Resorts Atunyote and Shenendoah Courses - in Verona, New York.





Enumclaw Golf Course now becoming solid winter option

When Bob Gelinas took over the management at Enumclaw Golf Course more than two years ago, he knew what needed to be done. He had heard the complaints from golfers at Enumclaw and he was ready to take action.

Now, more than two years later, the course is drier and the rounds are up.

"The two went hand in hand," said Gelinas.

"Once people found out the course was in better shape and drier word of mouth helped get more people out here. And rounds are up."

Enumclaw Golf Course has always seen its share of play, but the big knock was the wet conditions in the fall and winter months. Gelinas has had his maintenance crew install almost a mile of drainage so far and more is to come. The big difference has been drier fairways on a couple of

holes. Gelinas' brother-in-law Steve Schmidt and his company SideTool have come in and made quick work with the trenching projects. In addition, extra work continues on the approaches of every hole with punching and sanding. It's made great improvements for shots that are 40 yards or less to the green.

Enumclaw Golf Course is owned by the city and Gelinas owns the management contract for the course and maintenance. He hopes to keep making big changes.

"We will try and work on the drainage and irrigation of a couple of holes each year." Gelinas said. "People like a dry golf course."

If you haven't played Enumclaw in a while, not only is it drier, but the nines have been flipped to help improve the overall feel and pace of play.



Charming in Charleston: Stono Ferry, Shadowmoss are terrific and historical

If you a history buff and golfer, Charleston is a place that has you covered. From the terrific variety of golf courses to the historical stories that go with some of the courses, Charleston is a history lesson and terrific golf opportunity all rolled together.

From places like Shadowmoss Golf Club to Stono Ferry Golf Links, Charleston is a place where you can tee it up near the Atlantic Ocean and learn about some U.S. history.

How's that? Take a look at the sign that sits on one of the holes at Stone Ferry and talks about the Battle of Stono Ferry on June 20, 1779, a battle that was part of the revolutionary war between the Americans and British. It was a battle that killed President Andrew Jackson's older brother Hugh. The area is chock full of that kind of history plus some great golf.

• Stono Ferry Golf Links is a place where history really comes out. Part of the course was battlefield in 1779 between the Americans and British as 300 soldiers lost their lives. An old railroad line between Savannah and Charleston ran right where the golf course is today in the late 1850's and was the main lifeline between the two cities. But don' forget about the golf.

Stono Ferry is ranked among the top courses in the area for a reason. There was plenty of challenging holes and plenty of holes with some water views. The finishing hole is a par-4 with an island green.



The Lesson Tee: Here are some ways to overcome those nerves around greens

Many golfers come to me struggling with their pitching and chipping. Sometimes they even have the yips around the green. After a while these poor images abort their short game and become difficult to overcome.

Step one:

Create a reactive routine that take the conscious mind out of the equation.

If every golfer made "the game of golf" more reactive; took less time and incorporated a subconscious flowing routine on EVERY shot most would not only play better but have more fun!

In your routine: Waggle looking at the target, spend more focus on the target and less time standing and thinking while looking at the ball. I like to imagine Steph Curry shooting a basketball. Let it go! Keep moving! Less thought. Less energy. Less time.

Step two:

Practice landing the ball where you want. Place a shaft or even a hula hoop on the green and get better at landing the ball where you want. Forget the hole, practice landing the ball where you want.

Step three:

If every golfer leaned more left at address with chest and nose on top of the golf ball, and finished turning on your left hip/leg all would hit their pitches more solid.

Take out the ROOTS of the grass not just the tops of the blades of the grass. (good image) Thump the roots as you turn. (photo 1 and 2)

Step four:

Big key here. Most poor to average pitchers of the golf ball create too many angles with their elbows folding and wrists hinging.

Imagine you have casts on your arms:



In your routine: Waggle looking at the target, spend more focus on the target and less time standing and thinking while looking at the ball. I like to imagine Steph Curry shooting a basketball. Let it go! Keep moving! Less thought. Less energy. Less time.

(photo 1 and 2) and just turn your triangle of your two arms and chest back and through. Remember always start left and finish left. Its like your chest is the hub of the wagon wheel and your arms are the spokes. Keep it moving. Less hinge, less folding of your arms.

Rules of the Game: There are several ways to improve your knowledge of golf rules



I am frequently asked how a person can learn more about the Rules of Golf. So here are some resource options.

In the Rules of Golf book, on pages 11-17, there is "A Quick Guide to the Rules of Golf". I think this is a great place for players or budding rules officials to start. Most people should be able to read this guide in about an hour.

On the web, at USGA-Rules.com, are the "Rules of Golf Explained" videos. The 12 videos are each about 5 minutes long. And while they won't win any Oscars, I think they are pretty good at explaining a number of important rules concepts and procedures. I like these videos.

The USGA has recently introduced the "Rules of Golf Experience" on their web site. I have tried some of it, but not enough to have an informed opinion.

In the Rules section of the USGA web site, you can take rules quizzes. This is a quick and easy way to test your knowledge of the rules. I like these quizzes.

Of course, a person can always just read the Rules of Golf, either in book form or



Golf Rules Illustrated (an older edition), and Decisions on the Rules of Golf

on the USGA web site. But I think most people would find it a tough read. Instead, I recommend "Golf Rules Illustrated". This is a USGA publication that takes the rules and adds pictures, diagrams and famous incidents to bring the rules to life. This is a much easier and more enjoyable read.

And then there are the Decisions (available in book form and on the USGA web site) for those who want to take their knowledge of the rules to a higher level. There are over 1,200 Q&A format decisions that clarify the rules. Most of these decisions are the result of actual incidents that have occurred in real tournaments.

And finally, the "gold standard" for rules training is the PGA/USGA Rules of Golf

Workshop. These workshops are offered every winter in about 20 locations around the country. I've attended five of the 4-day workshops over a span of twelve years, and I can report that they are excellent. I can also report that the total cost of registration (\$350), travel, hotel, and meals can approach \$1,000. Thankfully, some golf organizations offer partial reimbursements for their working rules officials.

So please give one or more of these resources a try to improve your knowledge of the rules.



or special event, the Twin Lakes clubhouse has plenty of room for meetings and banquets for any type of occasion on or off the course.


The club opened as a private facility nearly 50 years ago but became semiprivate a few years ago offering public tee times. But Twin Lakes is still a place with that private feeling.
