Central Oregon Shootout is all set for April 27-29

If you want to get your 2018 tournament calendar cranked up, then look no further than the Central Oregon Shootout, one of the top amateur tournaments in the Pacific Northwest every year.

The event is held at Aspen Lakes, Black Butte Ranch Resort and Eagle Crest Resort. There are three different formats held over three different days for two-player teams.

The tournament is set for April 27-29 (Friday through Sunday) at all three of these awardwinning golf courses.

The tournament started in 2003 and has been going strong since Day One. Payouts total more than \$20,000 for over six flights. Women only and mixed teams are also welcome in addition to men and senior divisions.

With a limit of 150 two-player teams it's important to sign up early. The formats for the tournament call for a scramble, best ball and chapman.

There will be a kickoff party for the tournament at Aspen Lakes' Brand 33 Restaurant.

Registration is \$625 per team and spring time in Central Oregon is always the right time. For more info see www.aspenlakes.com.

Drive, Chip and Putt set qualifiers in the Northwest

The United States Golf Association, Masters Tournament and PGA of America have officially launched the sixth year of the Drive, Chip & Putt Championship by announcing the local and subregional schedule for the 2018-2019 qualifying season.

The 2019 qualifying schedule includes dates and locations for participants to play in local qualifiers across the country, with the opportunity to advance and earn an invitation to next year's National Finals at August National Golf Club. Seven courses in WSGA territory will host local qualifiers and two will host subregional qualifiers for the 2019 Championship.

Northwest native and PGA Tour star Kyle Stanley will host AJGA event

Kyle Stanley, a two-time PGA TOUR winner, will host the Kyle Stanley Championship by Transamerica, Sept. 14-16 at Canterwood Golf & Country Club in

his hometown of Gig Harbor, Washington.

"I couldn't be more excited about the Kyle Stanley Championship by Transamerica to be held at Canterwood Golf & Country Club," Stanley said. "It combines three things that have been very in-



strumental to my golf career: the AJGA, Canterwood and Transamerica. I am looking forward to being a part of this great event and hope the Gig Harbor community will embrace and support the tournament."

Stanley played with the AJGA from 2004-06, winning two tournaments and earning Rolex Junior All-America honors all three years. In addition to competing in stroke play events, Stanley also represented the victorious West Team at the 2005 and 2006 Wyndham Cups.

Stanley was a standout college golfer at Clemson, setting 18 individual scoring records in his freshman season. The two-time All-American was named the 2006-07 ACC Player of the Year, won the Ben Hogan Award in 2009 for best collegiate golfer and competed for the winning 2007 American Walker Cup Team.

Since turning professional in 2009, Stanley has won two PGA Tour events, most recently at the 2017 Quicken Loans National.

Transamerica has supported Stanley throughout the entirety of his PGA TOUR career. The Kyle Stanley Championship by Transamerica is Transamerica's third title-sponsored AJGA tournament. In 2017, Transamerica supported the Hale Irwin Colorado Junior by Transamerica and the Azahara Munoz Championship by Transamerica.

Waste Management Phoenix Open: More of a party than a PGA Tour golf tourney

I was talking to a friend a while back and he has some things on his golf bucket list that are completely understandable. Trip to Scotland. Golf in Hawaii. And a trip to the Waste Management Open in Scottsdale.

The Waste Management Open at the TPC Scottsdale? Before you question that part of the list, have you ever seen the tournament on television? Have you talked with someone who has been there? Do you like parties on a golf course?

My friend thought that part of his list was maybe a bit off course but I said he was dead on. The tournament is a must-see for any golf fan. I went for the third straight year and it was better than ever.


There were over 190,000 golf fans (and I use the term loosely) on a Friday watching the best the PGA Tour has to offer. Jordan Spieth was there. So was Justin Thomas. Bubba made his annual trip and Phil went low on the weekend.

There was even a streaker on Thursday who ran loose for at least four minutes before being corralled by security. But before he was subdued he showed off his golf swing in his birthday suit as well as some rumbling and stumbling up and down a fairway.

This is more than just a golf tournament. There were ladies dressed like it's a night out on the town, and in some cases it is. The Owl's Nest is a party place after the round and had some world-class acts performing this year including Florida Georgia Line and OneRepublic.

But the big draw is the 16th hole. It might be a relatively tame par-3 where the professionals use anything from a wedge to an 8-iron, but it is a hole surrounded by 20,000 spectators. If golfers are looking for quiet, forget it. In fact when one player walked off with a double bogey the crowd let him have it chanting "double bogey" while he walked off the green, probably wishing he was somewhere else

Sitting around the 16th hole is an experience like nothing else. Sure, many of the fans in the



stands are well lubricated but most are behaved and many wear matching outfits or other eye catching forms of attire.

Bucket list? My friend got that right. And the Waste Management Open should be right near the top of that list every time.

If a player returns a scorecard with a score lower than actually taken and the sole reason for the lower score was he did not include a penalty he did not know he had incurred the penalty applied is 2 strokes. The penalty applied is the penalty for the breach of the Rule. This is provided the new local rule is in effect which modifies the exception to Rule 6-6d from 4 strokes to two strokes



Virgie Robinson tourney set for April 21

In April there is a golf tournament in the Tri-Cities that may appear, on the surface, to be just another tournament amongst so many, but the significance of this event is much more. It's called the 6th Annual Virgie Robinson Scholarship Charity Spring Golf Classic and it takes place on April 21 at Sun Willows Golf Course.

Virgie Mary Chambers was born to sharecroppers in 1919 and never graduated from high school, not uncommon in those years. She married Richard Robinson in Tacoma in 1945 and moved to Pasco in 1947 after Richard was discharged from the Navy. While in Pasco Virgie got her GED and attended Columbia Basin College. It was at this time that she became a strong supporter of education and started to make a difference in the lives of many children and their families in the area.

She wanted to plant the seeds for higher education in elementary students and became Pasco's first ombudsman/home visitor in 1966 where she worked with the area's most at-risk students. Throughout her life she was a dedicated volunteer, educator and community civil rights activist in the Pasco School District.

To commemorate Virgie's many achievements her son Rickie Robinson and his sisters, partnering with a local radio station, created a scholarship fund in her name with the aim toward providing scholarships to Pasco students who have attended her namesake school. In 2015 five former Virgie Robinson Elementary School students received \$1,000 scholarships. Past winners have attended Columbia Basin College, Central Wash. University and the University of Washington.



In total, players who have teed it up in Portland since 2014 have accounted for 31 wins on the PGA TOUR. Most notably, Justin Thomas broke through for his fifth win of the season and first Major Title at the 2017 PGA Championship at Quail Hollow. These wins led to Player of the Year Honors just three years after Thomas earned his PGA TOUR card here. Other alums in Thomas' class of 2014 include PGA TOUR winners Adam Hadwin, Daniel Berger, Tony Finau and Ryan Armour.


This year's field features a number of players with remarkable pedigrees. Sam Burns, a 21-year old from Shreveport, Louisiana won the 2017 Jack Nicklaus Award recognizing the Division I NCAA Player of the Year. After electing to turn pro following his Sophomore season at LSU, Burns will look to step into the PGA Tour spotlight this August. Wyndham Clark hopes to follow in fellow Oregon Duck Aaron Wise's footsteps and secure PGA Tour status in his Alma Mater's back yard.





Gamble Sands

Golf destination in Brewster, Wash. is ranked among the best in the Northwest

The place might be called Gamble Sands, but there's really not much of a gamble if you head to Brewster, Wash. for a round of golf. This is a sure thing.

Gamble Sands opened for play four years ago, and ever since it has been named one of the top public courses in the Pacific Northwest. And for good reason. This is a golf course that stretches over acres of former orchard land and was designed by Scotsman David McLay Kidd, who knows a thing or two about designing links golf courses.

The land is owned by the Gebbers family and when Cass Gebbers decided to get into the golf business he gave Kidd everything an architect would want: More than 600 acres set of sprawling Eastern Washington land with plenty of great views.


The course was a hit when the doors first opened. Playing from over 7,000 yards from the tips, Gamble Sands features wide fairways, plenty of roll and a course that Kidd calls "pure unadulterated golf."

The course gets your attention right away with the second hole playing as a reachable par-4 with the Columbia River as a backdrop.

The Cascade Putting Course also makes for an activity after the round of golf.

The Inn at Gamble Sands opened a few years ago and gives golfers a chance to stay and play. The Inn at Gamble Sands has suites and rooms with plenty of amenities. Danny Boy's restaurant offers dining right on site.

The Gebbers' family foray into golf started back in 2008 when Perry Dye designed three

holes of a golf course that was never finished. Then the plans came along for the 18-hole course. The Gebbers family, which is a giant in the apple and cherry business, decided that golf was a good thing to add to the family portfolio.

Brewster might be a bit of a trek, about four hours east of Seattle, but Gamble Sands is not a gamble at all. With the golf, hotel and other amenities, it has become a sure bet.





The Lesson Tee: Make sure that your backswing is giving you all you need

For the first time in my 23 plus years of my academy and teaching at Semiahmoo I went to Phoenix the month of January. Good move to do in January. I taught at Tom Lehman's private practice facility that he designed.

Many folks from Semiahmoo and the great Northwest came down and we enjoyed the time and the beauty of "Tom's Ranch."

I had the honor and privilege of being awarded Pacific Northwest Section PGA Teacher of the Year. As I say, "they are going to make a teacher out of me yet!"

Let's talk backswing. The backswing has two main purposes; to accumulate power by turning and hinging and to get us and the club in position to make an uninhabited path to the golf ball.

This is easiest and best repeatable when on the proper plane and we have an awareness of where we are in time and space.

See Photo 1. Here, Zach Johnson's coach, Mike Bender has a shaft even with his trail shoulder. This compares to Ben Hogan's "plane of glass" so often talked about. Turning under this shaft with chest, arms and hips give depth to the backswing. This turn to create depth is very important to help players shallow the shaft, swing down on plane and not come "over the top" of the plane.

Another image would be: Imagine as you turn under the pole, touch a wall behind you (Photo 2). This photo is a student of mine from Richland. His improvement has been significant applying these concepts and this swing station in Photo 1.

Notice how the left arm covers the right shoulder and the butt of the club shines on the target line. Also, if a line were drawn straight down from the butt of the club, the line would go through close to the right heel. This is the missing piece called depth to a golf swing. Depth allows a straight path for the hands, arms and club to the ball with fewer





compensation and moving parts.

Study these photos, work with the swing station and call me in the morning. And to see it all come together see the photo under this story with Zach Johnson's swing (Photo 3).



Rules of the Game: J.B. Holmes might have been slow, but wasn't against rules



During this year's Farmers Insurance Open in San Diego, J. B. Holmes made news when he took over four minutes to play his second shot on the 72nd hole. As was mentioned during the TV broadcast, players are generally allowed 40 to 50 seconds to play a shot. So taking over 4 minutes was over 4X the allowed time. Was he penalized for his slow play? No, he wasn't.

So what do the Rules say about this? The applicable rule is Rule 6-7 Undue Delay, Slow Play. The upper portion of the exhibit that accompanies this article shows a couple of excerpts from Rule 6-7. In general, all of the details about how pace of play is monitored and potentially penalized are contained in the Pace of Play Policy for an event.

So what does a Pace of Play Policy look like? They tend to be 1 to 2 pages long, too long to be included with this article. So the lower portion of the exhibit shows example elements of a Pace of Play Policy in order to give you an idea of its contents. While I don't have a copy of the PGA Tour Pace of Play Policy, I assume that it contains similar elements.

In general, individual stroke timings are only done for members of a group that is out of position

Excerpts from Rule 6-7 Undue Delay, Slow Play

The player must play without undue delay and in accordance with any pace of play guidelines that the Committee may establish.

Note 2: For the purpose of preventing slow play, the Committee may, in the conditions of a competition (Rule 333-1), establish pace of play guidelines including maximum periods of time allowed to complete a stipulated round, a hole or a stroke.

Example Elements of a Pace of Play Policy

Time allowed to complete holes and a round:

Par 3 - 12 minutes
Par 4 - 15 minutes
Par 5 - 18 minutes
Par 5 - 18 minutes

Turn Time (between holes 9 and 10) - 5 minutes
Round (18 holes) - 4:35 (assuming a par 72 course)

Time allowed to complete a stroke:

First to Play - 50 seconds

All other - 40 seconds

Pace of Play Time Checkpoints:

Hole 4, Hole 9, Hole 13, Hole 18

A group is "out of position" when:

They have exceeded their cumulative allowed time, and they are more than 14 minutes behind the group ahead.

Potential Penalties for a Stroke Play event:

First Violation - Warning

Second Violation - 1-stroke penalty Third Violation - 2-stroke penalty Fourth Violation - Disqualification

and "on the clock".

So was that last group at the Farmers Insurance Open out of position and "on the clock" on the last hole? I don't think so. None of the related reporting indicated that. Consequently, individual stroke timing was not in effect on that last hole, and, as a result, Holmes was not penalized. That said, he was certainly criticized by a number of his peers, and that will be the extent of his punishment for this incident.

As a Rules Official, I probably spend about half

of my time monitoring pace of play. Based on that experience, I believe that very few golfers are inherently slow players. Most of the time, slow play is a result of some combination of other factors, including inadequate starting time intervals, difficult course setup (extra length, fast greens, tucked pins, tall rough, etc), and bad weather.

The best Tournament Committees consider all of these other factors when planning and managing their events in order to promote a good pace of play.
