# Even without the thousands of fans, the 16th at TPC Scottsdale is a pressure shot

You have certainly heard about the Waste Management Phoenix Open. You have heard about the huge crowds, the party-like atmosphere throughout the TPC Scottsdale Stadium Course, the 16,000-plus fans on the par-3 16th hole . . . this is more than just a golf tournament. It's a week-long party where the golf happens to get in the way.

If you have seen the course on television, that is one thing. It's kind of like seeing Augusta National on television but you really don't realize how hilly the place is until you've been there. Same thing in Phoenix. Sure, you see the fans and the tents - but if you get a chance to play the course when it is all set up - that's another thing.

At the Waste Management Phoenix Open media day, it was a chance to play and see the course with all the bells and whistles. And these bells and whistles are big.

There are hospitality tents everywhere. The 16th hole must be seen to be believe from the tee box with the thousands of seats and suites lining both sides of the hole.

At the media day, our group was lucky enough to start on the 17th hole, a driveable par-4 (OK, for some but not for me) and we knew what hole we would be finishing up on. The timing couldn't have been better.

The tournament is in its 85th year and is the fifth oldest on the PGA Tour. Remember the days where Tiger Woods played and had fans help him move a huge boulder and he played the 16th hole without all the grandstands. This is a tournament that was named the 2019 tournament of the year by the PGA Tour and a tournament which is close to giving \$160 million to charity through the years. The Thunderbirds are the group which operates the tournament and every year they seem to up the ante.

This year new hospitality areas have been added, some areas have been increased and



Waste Management is signed on to be the title sponsor for years.

But what sets this tournament apart from every other on the PGA Tour schedule is the atmosphere and the work with charity. Mention the tournament to any golfer, and the first thing they think of is the 16th hole.

We had a chance to play it where the professionals do. On the surface is a 160-yard par-3 with a bunker left and a seemingly fairly easy shot. During tournament week, it's a different animal with the constant noise, cheering for good shots and boos for bad shots. On this day, I hit a weak shot short right. And there was no one watching. Highly disappointing. My playing partner John Dunn nearly knocked it in the hole for an ace. After some fake crowd cheers, he made the short putt for birdie.

Even without the fans, this was a treat to see the course all dressed up for tournament week

# USGA, R&A change rules for prizes amateurs can win; last month for the non-posting season

The USGA and The R&A are conducting a review of the Rules of Amateur Status to make them easier to understand and apply.

The comprehensive evaluation is part of the continued joint effort to modernize the Rules by reducing complexity and ensuring the Rules effectively guide how the game is played today.

As part of a review process that began in 2019, the governing bodies will seek the perspectives of golf's stakeholders as an integral component of the review process, including elite amateur golfers, golf event organizers, national golf associations, professional golf associations and other industry partners.

The aim is to provide the golf community with a modernized set of the Amateur Status Rules in late 2021, with the goal of an effective date of January 1, 2022

Thomas Pagel, senior managing director of Governance at the USGA, said, "One of golf's greatest benefits is that it can be played by all ages and played for a lifetime. It is our goal to ensure that the fundamental concept of what it means to be an amateur golfer is clear and retained to promote fair competition and enjoyment for everyone, while still addressing many issues that seek to protect the game. This is a forward-thinking approach and engaging golfers is a key component of doing what's best for golf."

New Rule 3-2b will read as follows:

Rule 3-2b. Hole-in-One Prizes: An amateur golfer may accept a prize in excess of the limit in Rule 3-2a, including a cash prize, for making a hole-in-one during a round of golf on a golf course.

An amateur golfer may also accept a prize in excess of the limit in Rule 3-2a, including a cash prize, for making a hole-in-one during contests held outside a round of golf, including multiple-entry contests and contests conducted other than on a golf course (e.g., on a driving range, golf simulator or putting green) provided in all cases that the length of the shot is at least

50 yards. More information on the Rules of Amateur Status can be found at www.usga.org and www.randa. org.

#### **Last month for non-posting**

It's that time of the season for golfers in the Pacific Northwest. As of the middle of November it is no longer allowed to post scores at courses shot around the Pacific Northwest. The non-posting time will run through the end of February

The reason for the non-posting of scores at golf courses in the Pacific Northwest is because of Mother Nature and the fact that all courses play what is called Winter Rules during the months of November through the end of February.

However, if you travel outside of the Pacific Northwest to places like Hawaii and Arizona, you can still post those scores.

#### Las Vegas World Amateur

If you are looking for another winter tournament escape from the Pacific Northwest, the Las Vegas World Amateur is set for Feb. 24-26 at some of the top courses in Las Vegas.

The three-day tournament will be held at the Revere Golf Club's Lexington and Concord courses as well as Chimera Golf Club. The tournament is open to golfers of all handicaps.

The entry fee of \$525 includes the three tournament rounds of golf, golf carts and range balls each day, a welcome party, tournament awards banquet and more. For more information on the Las Vegas World Amateur, call 206.818.4653.

### Architect Pete Dye dies

Legendary golf course architect Pete Dye, whose designs have played host to dozens of USGA championships, died on Jan. 9 in Gulf Stream, Fla., 12 days

after turning 94. His death comes 11 months after he lost his wife, Alice, a two-time U.S. Senior Women's Amateur champion and a collaborator on many of her husband's iconic courses.

Many of Dye's layouts are recognizable for their pot bunkers, bulwarks, small greens, railroad ties and other features he discovered in a transformational visit to Scottish links courses in 1963.

His courses are also highly challenging, earning Dye monikers such as Marquis de Sod and Dyeabolical. In perfect Dye character, he once said of his design philosophy, "Life is not fair, so why should I make a course that is fair?" He also said, "The ardent golfer would play Mount Everest if somebody put a flagstick on top."

Although none of his more than 100 designs has hosted a U.S. Open, layouts such as Blackwolf Run, in Kohler, Wis.; Crooked Stick, in Carmel, Ind.; Whistling Straits, in Haven, Wis.; Oak Tree National, in Edmond, Okla.; and The Honors Course, in Ooltewah, Tenn., have been the sites of historic USGA championships.

With choices like the Terrace Casitas and the Executive Lofts, you can stay right at the course and enjoy the amenities like a pool, jacuzzi, barbeque entertainment area and more. Lake Pleasant is nearby for some boating opportunities and there are plenty of hiking and biking chances around the area.


There are plenty of public golf course choices to make when traveling for that Arizona golf vacation, but Superstition Springs in Mesa offers a challenging course in a good location with good prices.

But what sets Superstition Springs apart is that it is part of the Arcis Golf Group and offers a variety of ways to keep golf affordable. There are three main plans that are offered from the Arcis Players Card to

## PNGA makes major changes to its 2020 championships

In 2019, the PNGA went through a much-needed assessment on its purpose and mission, specifically when it comes to the administration of championships.

British Columbia Golf, Idaho Golf Association (IGA), Oregon Golf Association (OGA), and Washington Golf (WA Golf) are all active allied associations of the PNGA. A great deal of time working together for the betterment of the game in the Pacific Northwest. When you collectively combine all of our different formats, schedules, and activities, it becomes very clear that some of the PNGA Championships are competing and/or conflicting with allied association events and we feel this is not good for the game.

The PNGA was founded in 1899 to conduct a regional men's and women's amateur championship and identify the top players in the Pacific Northwest, but also to allow top players from around North America to compete in our region. It was not until the 1980's that the PNGA added net competitions to some of its championships. At the time, this was done to attract a more diverse range of handicaps and golfing abilities to play in PNGA Championships. Since then, our allied associations have evolved and added much needed tournaments within their state or province that appeal to every type of golfing ability and provides a great membership benefit.

Therefore, the PNGA Board of Directors approved changes to our championships that will result in the PNGA solely focusing on competitions for the top amateur golfers in the Pacific Northwest. This will be done by retiring some championships, eliminating net competitions, and some new eligibility requirements. This will ultimately help to align all our schedules so that our regional championships are the next step a highly competitive player makes after playing in his or her State or Provincial championships.

This decision was extremely difficult. The PNGA realizes that by eliminating net competitions some loyal PNGA Championship participants might not play. However, the PNGA encourages everyone to take a

After years of meticulous study and thousands of shots analyzed by ShotLink, and in light of a desire to keep the focus on the golf, the PGA TOUR is announcing major enhancements to its existing slow-play policy that will go into effect at the RBC Heritage in mid-April.

Fines will go up as much as tenfold, stroke penalties could be meted out more frequently, and individual players will be on notice that they're on the slow list.

To that end, the TOUR will implement two major enhancements to deter slow play:

The Observation List – Historically, the slowplay policy has focused on groups being out of position. The Observation List will put additional focus on individuals whom ShotLink data has identified as the most egregiously slow players. Those players will go on and off the list based on a 10-tournament rolling period and will be subject to a 60-second average for all shots. If observed by a Rules Official to exceed this time, that player will be timed individually even if the group is in position.

Excessive Shot Times – Anyone in the field who takes more than 120 seconds to play a single shot, absent a good reason for doing so, will be given an Excessive Shot Time.

Additionally, fines and penalties for slow play have been enhanced significantly. Officials will now assess a one-stroke penalty for the second bad time in a tournament, not a round, and for every bad time thereafter in the same tournament. The fines for the second bad time in a season and for 10 cumulative timings in a season have also been raised to \$50,000. The fine for a second bad time in a season currently is \$5,000.individuals in addition to group position.

# The Lesson Tee: With these three aspects, you just might become a better ball striker in 2020

It seems amazing that we have entered 2020. I remember wondering about the turning of 2000 and Y2K.

I do believe we can be better ball strikers in this coming year. If we did these three aspects, drills and swing stations great things would take place.

1) Photo 1; Anti arm lift, more turn. Ben Hogan imagined swinging under a plane of glass resting on his shoulders. This enhances depth of your backswing, turning your pivot rather than merely lifting ones arms.

2) Photo 2; Shallower attack thru "Hitting Zone!" Place a soft on the ground parallel to the target line. Make sure your club head works under the shaft on ground. Hit shots off a tee. Promotes proper plane thru hitting zone. Most consistent path. Zach Johnson does this regularly.

3) Photo 3; Practice IMPACT! Squaring the club face to the board or golf ball consistently. Hands lead to and thru golf ball and hitting zone. Shoulders square ant impact, weight left, hips, slightly cleared. Copy the photo.

You can set up all the images and stations at home. Do the drills with or without hitting shots.

Get better no matter the weather.



# Dan Altmayer: Not the thing to do to play politics with your portfolio

You're probably aware this is an election year. During the next several months, the candidates will discuss issues that should greatly interest you as a citizen.

But as an investor, how concerned should you be with the results of the presidential and congressional elections?

Maybe not as much as you might think. At different times, the financial markets have performed well and poorly under different administrations and when different parties have controlled Congress. And after all the votes are counted, outcomes in the investment markets can be unpredictable. Consequently, you'll be helping yourself greatly by not making big moves in your portfolio in anticipation

of new legislation or political moves down the line.

Of course, that's not to say that nothing emerging from Washington could ever have an impact on your investment decisions. For example, if a future president and Congress decide to change the capital gains tax rate, it could affect some of your choices, such as which stocks and stock-based mutual funds you should buy, and how long you should hold them.

Overall, though, your investment results will ultimately depend on actions you can take, including these:

• Making changes for the right reasons – While the results of an election may not be a good reason to make changes in your investment portfolio, other factors can certainly lead you to take steps in this direction. For one thing, as you get closer to retirement, you may want to shift some – though certainly not all – of your investment

dollars from more growth-oriented vehicles to more conservative ones. Conversely, if you decide, well in advance, that you might want to retire earlier than you originally thought, you may need to invest more aggressively, being aware of the increased risk involved.

• Following a long-term strategy – In pretty much all walks of life, there are no shortcuts to success – and the same is true with investing. You need to follow a long-term strategy based on your goals, risk toler-





ance and time horizon, and you need the patience and perseverance to keep investing in all markets – up, down and sideways.

• Avoiding mistakes – Many people think of an investment mistake as failing to "get in on the ground floor" of some company that ultimately grew to huge proportions. But it's pretty hard to becomean early investor in companies like these, many of which start out as privately held businesses without any stockholders. Furthermore, companies with shorter track records can be much more unpredictable investments.

However, you do want to avoid some real mistakes, such as chasing "hot" stocks. By the time you hear about them, they may already be cooling off, and they might not even be appropriate for your needs. Another mistake: failing to diversify your portfolio. If you only own one type of asset, such as growth stocks, you could take a big hit during a market downturn. Spreading your dollars over a wide range of investments can help lower your risk exposure. (However, diversification by itself can't guarantee a profit or protect against all losses).

After Election Day, regardless of the outcome, you can help keep your portfolio on track by not playing politics with it.

# Looking for that solid feeling on shots, impact position is the key

Impact is key to getting a solid feeling good shot.

Here is two very different still photos of impact position.

If you body stays, too far behind the ball at "impact" your shots might result in:

Chunking it, hitting it fat, skulling it.

Your torso (sternum) is too far behind the ball, therefore your bottom of your "swing" it not where the "ball is".

Notice the feel of this "impact position." This is what we are looking for. We call this turning to the left side, get to the left leg (if your body will allow it), push off the ground with your right foot to feel this.

We want your head slightly behind the ball, your hips at an "angle," your arms extended to make solid contact with the ball.


Work on this "impact feel," I used three alignment rods to help feel the "three walls in golf."

Sometimes working on impact feel (frees that position) is key to what your body does in motion. I look forward to seeing everyone this winter at SilverRock Resort, in LaQuinta, California.

# Rules of the Game: Bunker problems? Make sure to assess the situation first



The player found herself in a steep bunker with steps inside it to access the bunker safely. Her ball was in a position that she would have interference from the steps if she wanted to make a stroke at her ball. She correctly determined she was entitled to free relief from the steps, dropped her ball within the one club length free relief area no closer to the hole and frowned. She now had no room for a backswing as she was very close to the steep back bank of the bunker. The accompanying photos show her predicament both before and after dropping her ball.

Her response, "I'll just take a one stroke penalty under the new rules and drop outside the bunker," caused me to wince. There was both good and bad news here. Yes she could drop outside the bunker, but it was going to cost her more than one stroke. The reason? Once she dropped the ball under the correct rule of interference from an Immovable Obstruction, her ball was now in play. A ball in play cannot be picked up or moved without applying a Rule of Golf. She was now required to declare it unplayable for a one stroke penalty, select the option of dropping outside the

bunker for a second penalty stroke and then proceed.

Is there any way she could have avoided getting a total of two penalty strokes while still getting what she wanted; in this case, a drop outside the bunker? Yes, there is. Upon declaring that she wished to take relief from the steps, she could have immediately gone outside the bunker and dropped the ball outside for a one stroke penalty.

It must be dropped on a line behind the spot where her ball originally lay and where the hole is located, often referred to as backon-the-line relief. A careful assessment of the situation might have shown the likelihood of

the difficult shot from the free relief drop in the bunker.

The moral of the story is....assess first, then pick up your ball. Above all, if you have already picked it up, know that you are committed.

If it is already in your hand, hang on to it until you are sure of what you can do for the least number of strokes.

The new Rules of Golf sound like you get a few freebies, but you really don't. Check out the videos on the USGA.com website for more interesting situations and applications. It may save you a stroke and we all appreciate that!


