Changes could be coming soon for the way amateurs receive prizes and keep eligibility

The USGA and The R&A have announced proposals for significant changes to the Rules of Amateur Status that govern the game worldwide.

These proposals result from a modernization initiative that has identified a clear need to bring the Rules up to date to reflect today's global amateur game and ensure that the Rules are easier to understand and apply.

The proposed Rules, along with explanations to key changes, have been posted on usga.org and randa. org and the organizations are now inviting feedback from golfers and stakeholders. Comments were accepted through Friday, March 26, with the new Rules scheduled to be adopted on January 1, 2022.

This review reaffirmed amateur golf's important

position in the game and the value in maintaining amateur status Rules to safeguard all the ways golf is played and enjoyed.

The result is a set of Rules that redefine the distinction between amateur and professional golf and provide a condition of eligibility – amateur status – for amateurs who compete in golf competitions.

As part of the modernization effort, it is proposed that the new Rules will identify only three acts that will result in a golfer losing their amateur status:

- Accepting a prize in excess of the prize limit.
- Accepting payment for giving instruction.
- Accepting employment as a golf club professional or membership of an association of professional golf-

ers. To achieve this simplified approach, the following key changes are proposed:

- Eliminating the distinction between cash prizes and other prizes.
- Using the prize limit as the only way an amateur can lose amateur status through their play (meaning that entering or playing a competition as a professional would not, of itself, result in the loss of a player's amateur status).
- Removing restrictions from the Rules surrounding competitions such as long-drive events, putting competitions and skills competitions that are not played as part of a tee-to-hole competition; and
 - Eliminating all sponsorship restrictions.

Tacoma's Highlands celebrates 90th anniversary in 2021

And one last nugget he threw in there. "Enjoy the 108 bunkers." Did we hear him right? Yes, enjoy the 108 bunkers. That's 1-0-8. And after 18 holes at the Wildfire Faldo Course, we found plenty of them. And these just weren't little guys around the fairways and greens, some of these were so big it looked like a desert.

But I will say that is what makes the Faldo Course at Wildfire a treat - the bunkers, the large greens, the inviting fairways and the surround scenery with the McDowell Mountains.


Traveling during COVID-19 has been a plus. yes, I have taken the proper precautions, masking up everywhere, not getting close to people but why not take advantage of the cheap airfares and play places that would not normally be on my schedule.

Wildfire is part of the JW Marriott Phoenix Desert Ridge and Spa Resort in Phoenix. When you make the turn into the resort, you know you are in a different world. The resort spread across acres, there are two golf courses (the other being an Arnold Palmer design) and there are amenities galore. In fact, the LPGA had its Founders Tournament from 2011-18 at the resort, using nine holes of each course.

It's easy to see why this place was named one of Travel and Leisure Golf's "World's Best Resorts" and Conde Nast Traveler's Top 100 Golf Resorts.

This is a place which is a golfer's paradise. In addition to the two courses, there is a large practice area, multiple putting greens and, of course, a sand trap for practice before you tee off. And if your game decides to get crazy, you will be glad for that sand bunker tune up before you tee off.


You get a taste of just how big the resort is as

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
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



First African-American USGA champ Wright passes away; Myrtle Beach World Amateur set for its 2021 tournament

Bill Wright, who was inducted into the Pacific Northwest Golf Hall of Fame in 2013 after a career which included being the first Black golfer to win a USGA national championship, passed away at 84.

Wright was born in Kansas City, Missouri, and his family moved west when he was 12. He started playing golf at 14, joining the Fir State Golf Club's junior program at Seattle's Jefferson Park Golf Course.

Fir State was established in 1947 to combat discriminatory practices and, at the same time, to promote access to golf within the minority community. An important part of the club's mission was to stimulate interest and participation of young people in the game.

Wright was introduced to the game by his parents, Bob and Madeline, who were early members of Fir State. Bill was one of the first participants in Fir State's junior golf program in the 1950s, and within a year after picking up the game he was the city's Junior champion.

Local U.S. Open qualifiers are set

The United States Golf Association (USGA) announced local qualifying sites for the 121st U.S. Open Championship. The U.S. Open will be contested at Torrey Pines Golf Course (South Course), in San Diego, Calif., for the second time from June 17-20, 2021. Local qualifying, conducted over 18 holes at 109 sites in 43 U.S. states and Canada, will take place between April 26-May 18.

In 2020, U.S. Open qualifying was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic, leading to an all-exempt field at Winged Foot Golf Club. The USGA accepted 9,125 entries for the 2019 championship at Pebble Beach (Calif.) Golf Links. The record of 10,127 entries was established for the 2014 championship on Pinehurst Resort & Country Club's Course No. 2, in the Village of Pinehurst, N.C.


Golfweek Amateur Tour hits the NW






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The Lesson Tee: The 'Wall Drill' should help you with your ball striking this golf season

I love the spring, summer and fall! Winter not so much. I love teaching golf and playing tournaments! I encourage all to set some golf goals and practical ways to achieve them.

Play a couple tournaments also along the way during that time.

See Photo 1. "Wall Drill." This drill and image is so effective! Please "Just Do It!" Your ball striking with improve. Turn hips and pivot without swaying and touch the wall slightly above shoulder high. This drill creates depth on the backswing to encourage a proper/shallow/on plane/not steep angle of approach to the golf ball. So key! Imagine "The Wall" as you play and practice.

Photo 2. Another effective way to promote depth on backswing and proper shallowing on downswing is an anti-lift pole. Big time proper practice and image on course. Ben Hogan imagined a plane of glass on his shoulders, swinging under it without breaking the glass!

And then check the results. Photo 1 and 2 produce Photo 3



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Rules of the Game: Know what to do when your ball is muddy

It's spring, the temperatures are rising, and the golf courses are calling your name. There are a couple of conditions common to spring golf in the Pacific Northwest.... mud and goose poop. Knowing what you are allowed to do in these situations within the Rules of Golf is useful and might even win you a bet or two at the 19th hole even if you never have to apply them.

The first step is to find out if your course or your competition group has established any kind of local rule(s) for lift, clean and place for balls in muddy conditions. The local rule could be for: 1) the course in general, 2) only a ball on the fairways or even only for 3) a specific hole which is prone to wet conditions. If there is no local rule in place, you play your ball as it lies. Some folks like to claim a muddy ball is embedded, fair enough, just be certain that the ball is embedded in its own pitch mark. If you have seen it bounce and roll, it's not embedded in its own pitch mark.

If lift, clean and place is in allowed, that is exactly what you are entitled to do: lift your ball, clean it and place it back on its spot on the course. The wording of "preferred lies" adds the additional provision of placing it on a "better lie," usually within a club length. Check the wording and smile!

You may be playing with purists who feel the concept of "play the course as you find it and your ball as it lies" is the true test of golf. Your ball looks muddy, what are you allowed to do? Not a lot; if you can identify it as yours, you play it as it lies. If you can't identify it Rule 7.3 says you are allowed to lift the ball (mark it first! and clean it enough to identify it. When you return it to the course you may position it so that the remaining mud is facing away from your club face, but you cannot tee it up using the mud as a tee.

Now, let's look at the goose poop issue. No, it really doesn't qualify as a dangerous condition, sorry. It's much like the mud on your ball. If you can identify it as your ball, you are to play it as it lies. If you cannot identify it, Rule 7.3 gives you authorization to lift the ball (again, mark it first!), clean it enough to identify it,



and return it to its location on the course. Once again you can position the remaining droppings away from your club face but cannot tee the ball up on it. In both cases, keep your mouth closed when you hit the ball, you'd hate to get a splat of mud or poop!

Just a note, cleaning it more than enough to identify it is a one stroke penalty. Secondly, if you fail to mark it first, you have a one stroke penalty and you can now clean it all you want. Plus, you always have the option of declaring it unplayable for one stroke and now you can clean it all you wish, or substitute another ball, and play it in a different location under any of the three options available under Rule 19. It's always worth considering.

Ryan Young: When it comes to chipping, par is always OK

What's the point of chipping? I ask this question to all my students who are seeking help with their short game. Most all of them answer incorrectly by saying, "to make it." It's a logical answer, but one that is most likely the cause of their struggles in the first place. The point of chipping isn't to make it, but to give your self the best opportunity to save par.

A chip replaces a lag putt. When you hit the green in regulation, you're afforded two putts to make par. In this scenario, the average golfer will use their first putt to lag close to the hole and tap in for par. When you miss the green, you exchange one of your putts for a chip, thus making your chip a lag opportunity to help you save par. On Tour, any putt inside three feet has a 99% chance going in. Anything outside five feet and the chance of saving par drops drastically (a point of discussion for another day). So the real goal of chipping is to get it inside three feet.

Continuing with this thought process, you must then determine the best club selection for your chip. This is when I believe confidence outweighs strategy. Young amateurs are frequently ridiculed for choosing too much loft around the green. Logic says to only choose the loft necessary to carry onto the green and then roll out to the hole. However, if all you do is practice with your lob wedge and you are more confident controlling your distance with it, then fire away. Its only when distance control becomes an issue that we should discuss the "bump and run" with less loft.

This brings us to our last point. If you want to get better at chipping it inside three feet, then you must elevate your course management. As you are hitting your approach shot, you must strategize your miss (see my last article for more detail on this topic). If you can plan your missed approach shot in an area easiest for your chipping abilities, then you are giving yourself the best opportunity to save par. Better think twice before you fire directly at a






tucked flag.

With a little course management, some statistics, and most importantly GAME management, you will undoubtedly start lowering your scores. This all can be done before we even address your swing mechanics. Its really a simple concept, but hard to remember in the moment. Let the "Inside 3 Feet" concept help give you confidence next time you're chipping and save par.

Myths about establishing a handicap

Think having a handicap isn't for you? Think again.

Below we dispel some myths that have been ingrained in the minds of many golfers about getting and maintaining a handicap.

Handicaps are only for really good golfers

Any golfer, whether they're a novice or a seasoned player, can establish a handicap index at any time in their golf journey. The underlying purpose of the Handicap system is to level the playing field so golfers of differing abilities can compete fairly with each other for a more enjoyable game.

I'm not a good enough golfer to get a handicap

Establishing a handicap index and posting your scores consistently provides you with a tool for tracking your progress and will only make you a better golfer. Obviously, watching your scores go down is fun to see, but when your scores aren't getting better, that's your cue to make adjustments or to take a lesson for a tune-up.

I only golf for fun

Having a handicap takes your game to a whole other level of fun. Sure, golf is an individual sport, but with a handicap you can have a friendly competition or side games with other handicap holders in your group regardless of differences in playing ability.

If you enjoy the challenge of competition and want to play against golfers with similar or better skill levels, consider entering a golf tournament. Many tournaments, including WA Golf championships, require a handicap to ensure that you are placed in the proper division for a fair competition.

Planning a dream golf trip to play Royal County Down or the Old Course at St. Andrews? If you don't have a handicap yet, better give yourself enough time to play and post scores for three 18-hole rounds of golf to get

your handicap. Some golf clubs abroad require proof of handicap to play on their course.

You have to post a lot of scores to get a handicap index

With the new World Handicap System, you only need to post a total of 54 holes, made up of 9- or 18-hole scores, to get your handicap. The more scores you post, the more accurate your Handicap Index.

It takes too much time

There's an app for that. The USGA GHIN app makes it convenient to post your scores. You can post after

every hole, after every round or post scores later when get you home.
Just do it as soon as practical after your round. Your Handicap Index will be updated overnight and your score will be included in the daily Playing Conditions
Calculation for that course.

I don't want to do math

Again, there's an app for that. Simply upload your scores on the app and GHIN takes care of the computation for you. Your Handicap Index is adjusted daily.

I have to join a club

This one is actually not a myth.

Core to the USGA Handicap System is the idea of peer review and oversight, hence the requirement to be a member of a certified USGA "golf club" to maintain a handicap. Fortunately, WA Golf has more than 600 clubs to choose from throughout

Washington and Northern Idaho. Think of them more like communities of golfers who get together to play for fun, competition and camaraderie. Still not your thing? Many WA Golf clubs offer an Associate level membership providing only your USGA Handicap Index and its computational services with no strings attached, while still receiving other WA Golf member benefits.
