



Woman amateur **Swann takes the** championship at the Oregon Open


Kennedy Swann of McKenzie Bridge, Ore. shot rounds of 71-65-69 to win the Oregon Open Invitational, held at the Glaze Meadow course at Black Butte Ranch in Sisters, Ore.

Swann, an amateur, was competing against the region's PGA club professionals. The tournament is one of four majors conducted each year by the Pacific Northwest Section PGA.

Amateur Mason Koch of Fairwood Country Club and professional Brady Sharp of Wine Valley tied for second in the tournament at 207 - two shots behind.

Last month, in her final year of school as a fifth-year senior, Swann led the Ole Miss women's golf team to the school's first national title in school history, winning the NCAA Women's Championship. Swann finished 3-0 in match play at the championship.

Swann, who plays out of Tokatee Golf Club in McKenzie Bridge, made it to the quarterfinals of the 2020 U.S. Women's Amateur, which exempted her in to the 2021 U.S. Women's Amateur, to be held later this summer. Swann accepted an invitation to this year's Marathon LPGA Classic, courtesy her performance in the NCAA women's national championship. The Marathon LPGA Classic takes place July 8-11 at Highlands Meadows Golf Club in Sylvania, Ohio.

Home Course named as new host for Northwest Open Invitational

There will be a new home for the Northwest Open Invitational starting in 2022. The Home Course in DuPont, Wash. will be the home of the Northwest Open Invitational beginning in 2022. The inaugural agreement is for three years with the prospect of an additional two years. The tournament will feature a 168-player field consisting of professional and amateur golfers from the Pacific Northwest. The event had been held at WIne Valley Golf Club in Walla Walla, Wash.

The 2022 Northwest Open Invitational will take place on May 16-18. This marks a significant change from the August dates that the event occupied in recent years. In order to accommodate the move from summer to spring, the Muckleshoot Casino Washington Open Invitational will move from May to August, effectively swapping places in the Pacific Northwest PGA tournament schedule.

The Home Course, known as "The Home of Golf in the Northwest," has previously hosted other Pacific Northwest PGA events. The National Car Rental Pacific Northwest PGA Assistant Championship was held there in 2018; it was also the site of the Pacific Northwest PGA Senior Championship in 2015.

Bald Eagle at Point Roberts: Border course hopes to open and return to normal in 2021

When the United States and Canadian border closed more than a year ago, there was no doubt there would be repercussions sounding throughout both countries.

The governments of both countries kept promising to open the border. But the date kept moving. And moving. And moving some more.

With people not able to come and go like they used to, businesses near the border were in trouble. And that goes for the golf business too.


Take a look at the Bald Eagle Golf Club at Point Roberts, Wash. Since the border shut down back in March of 2020, the courses has been closed as well. You might ask why would it close down since it is on the American side.

Well, take a look at a map. Point Roberts is a place that you can only get to by driving 25 miles into Canada and then back into the United States. And with the border closed, getting to the courses has been impossible.

For some background, way back in 1846 something called the Oregon Treaty between the U.S. and Great Britain said that every bit of land south of the 49th parallel would belong to the United States. And what do you know - Point Roberts is just below the 49th parallel and sits on its own little peninsula of land that you can get to only by driving into Canada and back down into the United States.

The course has some interesting history as well. It opened as Point Roberts Golf Club before new owners came in and changed the name to Bald Eagle Golf Club. Before the change of ownership the course had been shut down because the previous owners could not afford to keep things up and

But with the COVID-19 pandemic, things changed. The border closed in March of 2020 and who knows when it will open. The course closed down as well but a slimmed down maintenance crew led by Rick Hoole has done what it can to keep the course in good shape - waiting for golfers to return. It's been like a ghost town at Bald Eagle Golf Club, but hopefully with things changing, and



people getting vaccinated, the course will open and golfers will return.

And speaking of COVID-19 Point Roberts has a population of around 1,300 for the longest time there was not one single case of COVID-19 in the town. But that still hasn't helped the golf course, which has not seen a player roaming the fairways in well over a year.

General Manager Kyle German is a dual citizen of Canada and the U.S. but is still stuck on the Canadian side of the border. But he likes that the course will be ready when the border opens and golfers will return to Bald Eagle. He said that almost all of their players are Canadians and because the Canadians couldn't not cross the border into Point Roberts and the U.S., he had no choice but to shut

But better days are ahead. And when the border opens between the United States and Canada, Bald Eagle will be ready.

Rules Answer

- Answer: The original ball is no longer the ball "in play" and can no longer be used for the score of the hole. When the player made a stroke at the "provisional ball" from a spot nearer to the hole than where the original ball was "estimated to be" the "provisional ball" became his ball "in play". Even though the search time had not expired the location the "provisional ball" was played from makes the remaining search time irrelevant. The key phrase to note is "estimated to be." Not where it was actually found.

Gearhart will host 2021 Hickory Open; Myrtle Beach World Am set for August

Gearhart Golf Links in Gearhart, Ore. will host the 2021 U.S. Hickory Open Sept., 12-14. The world's best hickory players, utilizing historic golf equipment, will compete in September for three days to place their name on the Champions Trophy.

Gearhart Golf Links, founded in 1892, is the oldest golf course west of the Mississippi River, and was chosen as the site of the 2021 U.S. Hickory Open because of its age, true links design, coastal breezes, and welcoming environment.

If you have been to the Northern Oregon Coast in the last few years, visitors will notice quite a change in the center of the sleepy, tiny town of Gearhart. The 129-year-old Gearhart Golf Links has undergone an extensive restoration, once again placing the course among the best in the state.

Improvements of note include massive tree removal, multiple new tees added for variety and length, fairway reshaping, and improved drainage resulting in faster, firmer greens. And that is just the golf course.

The property has a resort identity now, with Mc-Menamins operating the 34 hotel rooms on property, including 16 new rooms in the recently-opened Annex building. Open for business on June 29, 2018, the Annex also houses a fitness center and virtual golf training room playfully called the "Swingers Lounge."



Boeing Classic returns in August after COVID-19 pandemic put the tournament on hold for 2020

The COVID-19 pandemic put a hold on all kinds of things in 2020 - and count the Boeing Classic as one of those things. The tournament, part of the PGA Tour Champions, was put on hold for 2020. But now in 2021, the Boeing Classic is back and will features the top players from the PGA Tour Champions.

The tournament is set for Aug. 20-22 at the Golf Club at Snoqualmie Ridge, located just east of Seattle will feature a field of over 80 players.

The Boeing Classic has always been one of the most popular spots on the PGA Tour Champions since its first event back in 2005. In 2019, the last time the tournament was held, Brandt Jobe won the championship at 18 under par.

At this year's event, there is a little of something for everyone during the tournament week. It all kicks off on Monday Aug. 16 with the Seahawks Rumble at the Ridge, an event featuring local celebrities and former Seahawk players. A youth clinic will be held Tuesday before the Korean Air Pro-Am takes place on Wednesday and Thursday. The tournament kicks off Friday, Aug. 20 - and will get things started with a flyover from a Boeing jet.

Golf Channel will be on hand to broadcast all three rounds of the tournament.

There will be plenty of star power on display at the tournament. Northwest native Fred Couples headlines the field while others like John Daly, Bernhard Langer, Jerry Kelly and others will try and win the first-place check and the Boeing flight jacket, which annually goes to the winner of the tournament.

Tickets are available in a variety of ways. Daily tickets are \$20 in advance and \$25 at the gate. A weeklong tournament pass is \$40 in advance and \$50 at the gate. The Alaska Airlines Canyon Club will return and tickets are \$35 in advance and \$40 at the gate. The ANA Dreamliner Lounge which sits on the 18th hole has tickets for \$350.



Brandes, Hunter, Cook and Fisher all win titles at PNGA Senior Amateurs

PNGA Hall of Famer Tom Brandes of Bellevue, Wash. won the 56th PNGA Senior Men's Amateur while David Hunter of Federal Way, Wash. claimed the 11th Super Senior Men's title.

On the women's side, Rosie Cook of Bend, Ore. captured the 34th Senior Women's; and PNGA Hall of Famer Marcia Fisher of Molalla, Ore. went wireto-wire in winning the 9th Super Senior Women's

The four championships were held concurrently at Wine Valley Golf Club in Walla Walla, Wash, All four were three-day, 54-hole stroke-play competitions put on by the Pacific Northwest Golf Association.

Brandes shot all three rounds under par (71-69-70), the only player in the field to do so, and was six ahead of second-place finishers Erik Hanson of Kirkland, Wash. and Michael Jackson of Redmond, Ore.

Hunter put together rounds of 71-74-74 to win the Super Senior Men's by two shots over Denny Taylor of Gladstone, Ore. In 2019, Hunter won the Washington Super Senior Men's Amateur.

In very windy conditions, Cook shot a solid 2-overpar 74 in the final round, which included shooting 2-under-par on the back nine.

In the Super Senior Women's, Fisher went wire-towire in capturing the title. She opened with a 1-underpar 71, the only under-par round of the entire field in her division, and never looked back.

Champions crowned at NW PGA Junior

Grace Lee of Bellevue, Wash. and Max Herendeen of Bellevue, Wash. won the girls and boys 16-18 divisions at the 2021 Pacific Northwest Junior PGA Championship at The Home Course in DuPont, Wash.

Lee will join 144 of the nation's top female junior golfers in the PGA of America's premium junior event, the 45th Girls Junior PGA Championship, hosted at Valhalla Golf Club in Louisville, Kentucky, July 27-30, 2021. Herendeen will tee it up at the 45th Boys Junior PGA Championship, hosted at Kearney Hills Golf Links in Lexington, Kentucky.

Lee, 17, shot a total of 70-69-139 for the Championship and edged out Lauryn Nguye while Herendeen shot a 73-69 total to edge out Nathan Yocam.

In the Girls 13-15 age division, Tatum Otto and Jasmine Chen tied for first (Tatum won the scorecard playoff as advised in Appendix 1 of the Rules of Golf). Angela Zhang won the Girls 12 & Under age division.

In the Boys 13-15 age division, Ryder Odem won with Jeff Seong finishing second. Tristan Kim won the Boys 12 & Under age division in a scorecard playoff against Nathan Pai and Sinjin Tran.


Did you know....



The Lesson Tee: Hitting shots and playing are important, but don't forget the importance of putting in practice time

This year marks 27 years having The Jeff Coston Golf Academy at Semiahmoo. I'm grateful to Semiahmoo and all the hundreds of client/friends who have come from all over the Pacific Northwest and beyond and have allowed me to help them, "Play the Golf of their Dreams!"

Obviously hitting golf shots and playing is necessary for improvement, but drills, practice rehearsals, mirror work and swing feedback stations definitely enhance the process. Very few golfers incorporate these practices. They have sure helped my game.

Photo: One of my favorites. Two driver shafts stuck together with a swimming noodle. Place them at a diagonal about five inches inside your trail shoulder. Swing the club under the shafts. This will help you swing on a shallower angle of approach to




the golf ball and hitting zone. Most golfers are to steep on the downswing. You can make practice swings and hit shots off of a tee. Also, do this at home

"Wall Drill." Take your posture with your rear end against the wall. Turn your hips and shoulders and touch the wall with your left hand just above shoulder high. Do not move off ball or over shift weight. COIL. This creates depth to your backswing which allows a proper angle of approach on downswing. Feel the wall when you swing a club.

Reminder I mentioned mirror work. Here we go. Most golfers slide hips rather than turn and don't get behind ball. Copy this move of hips turning/rotating not sliding. This will allow a better upper body turn.

Rules of the Game: Local rules might help with a provisional

Model Local Rules have been developed by the USGA to allow the committees and local courses to address particular conditions specific to the course. Many of them are designed for use in higher level competitions and are not common for the recreational golfer. So why should the average golfer care about these Model Local Rules?

The answer is that they may be in use at the course you are about to play and understanding how a specific condition will be addressed is always an advantage. So, let's look at those that are being used more commonly.

One Model Local Rule that is gaining in popularity, especially for pace of play, is Model Local Rule B-3, A Provisional Ball for Ball in a Penalty Area.

A lot of golfers will be surprised to hear this is not currently permitted under the Rules of Golf. Many golfers routinely hit a provisional ball for a ball that is in a penalty area and are dismayed to find it is not allowed and that they have now played under stroke and distance.

It's even more discouraging to find your original ball in a playable lie and have to pick it up and put it in your bag. The new Model Local Rule permits the playing of a provisional ball for a ball that MAY be in a penalty area. If the original ball is found within the three minute search time the player may CHOOSE to play the original ball or the provisional. If you CHOOSE to play the original, it is to be played as it lies, no exceptions, no other options. If you CHOOSE to play the provisional ball, it is played under stroke and distance. To state the obvious, if the original ball is not found within the three minute search time, the provisional becomes the ball in play under stroke and distance.

Just to review, when are we permitted to play a provisional ball if this local rule is NOT in effect? It's pretty specific and very limited: a provisional ball may be played under Rule 18.2 for a ball that

may be out of bounds or may be lost outside a penalty area, period. Under Rule 18 if you find your original ball within the three-minute search you are obligated to abandon the provisional ball and must proceed with your original, no choosing one or the other. You found the original and ignored this rule, deciding to play the provisional instead? Oops, you now are playing under stroke and distance plus you have to add the general penalty for ignoring the rule (that's an extra two strokes in stroke play or loss of hole in match play, ouch!).

Teaching family and friends II

Tip #3 - When you finally take them to the course, keep it fun. The rules of golf are there to keep matches and tournaments fair. Beginning golfers are nowhere near ready to compete, so throw the rulebook out the window. Don't worry about tee boxes, introduce mulligans, allow free drops out of hazards, toss the ball out of bunkers, and give any putt inside three feet. Some of the most frustrating parts of this game are taken away with these relaxed rules.

Another thing to be aware of are the many external factors of this game that create undo pressure and deter fun. When a new golfer feels pressure from factors like judgment from others, pace-of-play, and weather conditions, then they are less likely to have fun. So introduce them into an environment that is inclusive. For example, our Academy hosts beginner events at our course that are in the late summer evenings when the course isn't booked, are only nine holes or less, do not have any scoring competitions, include adult beverages, offer a social atmosphere, and most importantly, are affordable. These are all factors



that make the game as fun and inclusive as possible.

These tips aren't meant to avoid using your local PGA Professional to help introduce your friend or family member to the game. They are here to help supplement their experience in between formal lessons. This is an amazing game with so many outlets for everyone to join. We want to ensure we give them the best opportunity to fine theirs. Keep it fun, praise Shot Euphoria, and start off easy.
