

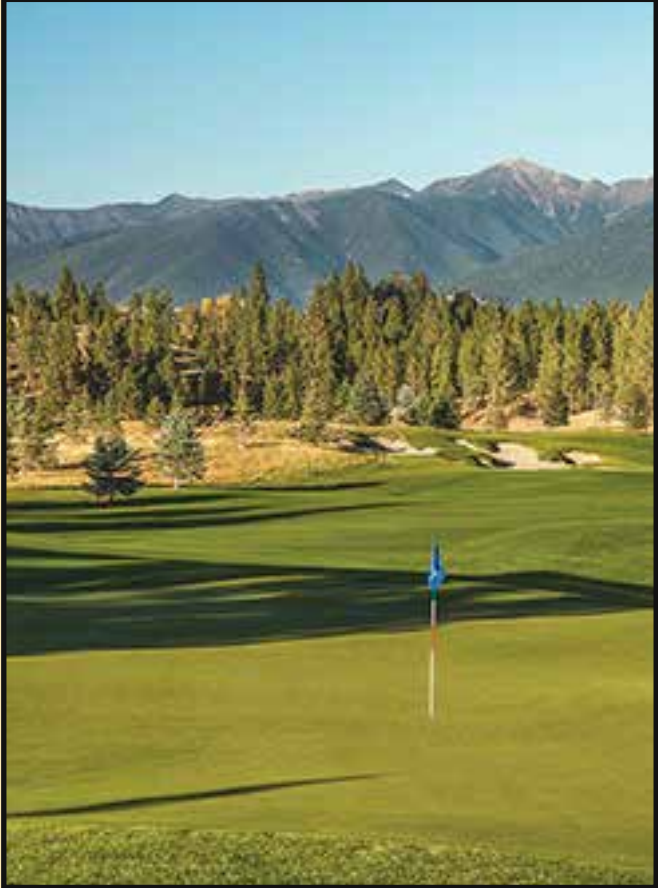

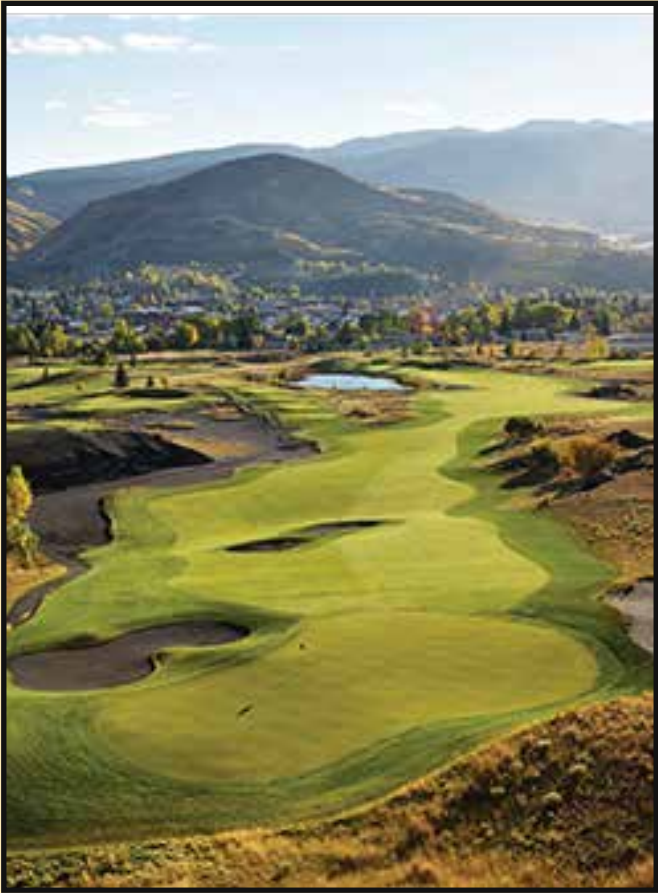
There is nothing like fall golf in NW

Fall golf in the Pacific Northwest: Just because the colors are turning doesn't mean to put the clubs away

While the fair-weather golfers put their cubs into the closet for the year, those of us that truly love the game know that the fall season can be the best time to play. The trees are displaying their magnificent colors, the greens are dark green and receptive, the fairways are a bit softer so that balls hit less than perfect, don't bounce into trouble nearly as often as they did during the firm summer fairways. October still finds the courses fairly firm so you don't have to worry about balls plugging in the fairways.

Probably the best part of fall golf is playing the lack of congestion, the slow playing that is associated with large crowds navigating the course is gone. Fall time brings out the true golf lover, the ones who may not be the best ball strikers but they know how to get around the course at a fair pace. If you choose your course carefully, you can often times have the course nearly to your self. Golf was meant to be played at a speed that is comfortable and not hurried or rushed because the group behind you is starting to drive on you or having to wait on every tee for the slow group in front of you.

As the days are getting shorter it is important to plan for earlier rounds. The weather is going to be cooler so choosing your clothing is an important consideration – pick multiple thin layers that don't restrict your swing but can be adjusted to the situation—a vest is always a good choice. Generally speaking, the close-in courses will get the majority of play in fall and winter months, which leaves the perimeter courses with more open tee times. We certainly don't want to discourage anyone from playing the city courses. Their tee sheets should also be a bit more open as well. Most courses are still dry this time of year so the options are wide open when choosing a course to play.

This is the time of year when jumping in the car and driving out of the city can be rewarding, to places like The Home Course in DuPont, Alderbrook on Hood Canal, or a 30-minute ferry ride across the water from Seattle to White Horse in Kingston. Also on the Olympic Peninsula is a terrific stop - Port Ludlow Golf Club. Always ranked among the top courses in the Pacific Northwest, Port Ludlow features a Northwest treat through trees along with plenty of other challenges.

In Oregon, the Portland area is another great option and Central Oregon, at places like Juniper, the fall golf options are terrific with the changing of the colors, course conditions and weather. And Black Butte Ranch Resort, also in Central Oregon, offers two championship courses and now a new putting course.

There are a bunch of great golf courses to choose from whether going north, south, west or east. And, don't forget just over the mountains, Eastern Washington still has some great golfing weather where you can extend the dry season a bit longer—places like Sage Hills near Moses Lake or Wine Valley in Walla Walla.

And Wine Valley is a place where you can not go wrong. Designed by Dan Hixson, the course is an award winner and for good reason. The large fairways, rolling greens and terrific views of the Blue Mountains make Wine Valley a terrific fall destination.

One huge benefit to fall golf is the off-season green fees. For some, the high-time rates can be challenging to average player who can only afford a few rounds a month while the reduced rates allow more people to play more often and keep the clubs in the car instead of in the closet.

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Portland's Glendoveer: A fall treat complete with 36 holes of golf

The city of Portland has some terrific fall golf, but none more so than at Glendoveer Golf & Tennis in east Portland, home of two championship golf courses.

There is plenty to like about Glendoveer with its two courses and challenging layout.

The 18-hole East at Glendoveer opened in 1923. Designed by John Junor, East at Glendoveer Golf & Tennis measures 6,295 yards from the longest tees and has a slope rating of 123 and a 68.5 USGA rating. The course features three sets of tees for different skill levels.

The 18-hole West at Glendoveer opened in 1928. Designed by Frank Stenzel, West at Glendoveer Golf & Tennis measures 5,922 yards from the longest tees and has a slope rating of 115 and a 67.2 USGA rating. The course features three sets of tees for different skill levels.

But there is much more than golf at Glendoveer - and the fall months are a perfect time to see what the facility has in store for golfers, walkers and anyone else who enjoys the outdoors.

There is a two-mile nature trail which rings the outside of the golf course, making a perfect walk any time of the day.

There are four indoor tennis courts on site. There is plenty to like. Now, there is even more.

Von Ebert Brewing has opened a location in the old Ringside Restaurant next to the clubhouse at Glendoveer. Von Ebert's new location at Glendoveer will feature a variety of beers

Anytime is a terrific time for activities at Glendoveer, but in the fall with the different colors and various things to do, this might just be the perfect time to see what Glendoveer has to offer on and off the golf course.

In previous years, a big Halloween event has taken place at Glendoveer which provided a safe, dry place for local kids to trick or treat in the "Haunted Forest" also known as the cart barn.

And in the past, Glendoveer Golf & Tennis has hosted the Nike NXN event which is Nike's high school national cross country championships.

Central Oregon: Fall golf is a sight to see with the brilliant changing colors

For fall golf, there might not be a better place than Central Oregon. With the vast array of colors, some snowcapped peaks and typically great golf conditions, Central Oregon is a hotbed of fall golf for locals and visiting golfers. Here's a look at a couple of options when traveling in this area:

• **Juniper Golf Course:** There's no doubt that Central Oregon continues to be a fantastic destination for golfers looking for a great golf getaway. When you hear golfers talk about their plans for golf in Central Oregon, the resorts in the area typically come to mind. But with so many golf courses to choose from during your golf get away, those who really know golf in Central Oregon often talk about Juniper Golf Course, the only resort quality golf course that is municipally owned, seconds from the airport in Redmond, Ore. Course.

The history of this golf course is extremely unusual. It's rare that a golf course completely moves from one location to another, but that's exactly what Juniper Golf Course did, relocating on a new piece of property a short drive away from its original location. Once a private 9-hole golf club, the City of Redmond acquired a larger piece of property and then enlisted the design services of renown golf architect John Harbottle, and reopened in 2005 with a brand new 18-hole championship golf course carved through the beautiful high desert landscape. The end result is a very popular and challenging layout with consistently superior course conditions and an experience that is unusually upscale for a municipal golf course. When you consider the green fees at this municipal gem are well under \$100

a round in season, you'll be hard pressed to find greater golfing value anywhere in the region.

• **Black Butte Ranch:** Black Butte Ranch is one of those special places that not only has plenty of family activities, but also offers two spectacular golf courses to choose from. And when fall hits, the colors are in full bloom and only add to the vacation experience.

With the Big Meadow and Glaze Meadow golf courses, Black Butte is a golfer's paradise. Each course provides a different, yet challenging golf experience and both are well worth the trip to Central Oregon.

The big news surrounding Black Butte Ranch is a brand-new main lodge that opened in May

2023. It is an awe-inspiring, natural modern space with full wrap-around, full height windows that offer a panoramic view of the Three Sisters, Broken Top and Mt. Washington. Built on the site of the 50-year old lodge, the \$19.5-million-dollar project was voted on and funded mainly by the Black Butte homeowners. It's the largest individual structure yet to be built on the ranch.

"I think it's going to be a destination for people to have special occasions," said Sean McCance, the resort's CEO. Weddings, anniversaries, reunions, are expected to drive a lot of new activity to the resort. For sure, it opens up a lot of interest and opportunities for visitors that are looking for a splendid experience.



Fall is the right time to play Eastern Washington

As you make your way over Snoqualmie Pass and head toward Central and Eastern Washington in the fall months, there is plenty to see. From the changing colors of the trees to perhaps a glimpse of snow along the pass, the seasons are definitely changing once September rolls around.

• **Wine Valley Golf Club:** Walla Walla is becoming a wine and golf shot spot. The once-sleepy hamlet in the southeastern corner of the state has become one of the premier wine destinations in the United States. But if you were looking to pair fine public-access golf with wine touring and tasting, the pickings were slim. The uncorking of Wine Valley Golf Club a few years ago changed all that – for the area and for the Pacific Northwest. Ranked as one of the top courses in Washington by *Golfweek*, Wine Valley has been added to the must-play list for golf enthusiasts. It is also 84th on the list of top Modern Courses.

Wine Valley Golf Club, designed by Oregon native Dan Hixson, blends immense scale, inspiring scenery and strategic challenges into a championship golf experience. The course has hosted the Northwest Open and the PPGA Men's Amateur.

• **Apple Tree:** Apple Tree in Yakima is one of the Northwest's premier golf experiences and given a 4-Star rating by *Golf Digest*.

The signature par-3 17th hole with its apple-shaped island green is one of the state's most recognizable holes. The hole is a masterpiece of golf architecture that measures over 10,000 square feet with nine different tee boxes to choose from.

The 17th hole is only one of many great holes at Apple Tree Resort. The course winds through 100-year old apple orchards with some

stunning water hazards and challenging elevation changes. The course and greens are always in perfect condition.

• **Lake Chelan:** Ever since it was built in 1970, Lake Chelan Golf Course has always been a popular spot for golfers visiting the area. Located on the lake's north side, Lake Chelan is a solid par-72 golf course that sits on a bluff with unparalleled views of the lake that will stay in your memory.

The course has three sets of tees and plays to 6,445 yards from the blue tees with a slope of 124. The reviews by visitors to Lake Chelan all talk about the fantastic views and the great condition of the course. If you are planning a trip to the Wenatchee/Chelan area you will want to put Lake Chelan Golf Course on your itinerary.

• **Columbia Point:** The course is not long by today's standards at 6,517 yards from the Black tees, but it will provide all the challenge you desire with four ponds, strategic bunker placement and fairways squeezed by trees, it requires some skill to make par surrender. Its level fairways make it easily walkable for golfers who prefer to walk. Many of the holes are side by side with high mounding between fairways, separating them visually, and protecting golfers from errant shots from the parallel fairways.

• **Canyon Lakes:** Canyon Lakes has won a variety of awards, including voted as Best Golf Course by the People's Choice Awards (six years in a row) making it the most popular course in the Tri Cities area. Rated 4 1/2 Stars by *Golf Digest*, making it the highest rated course in the Tri-Cities and shares the highest ranking in Washington State. In addition to the lofty rating, *Northwest Travel Magazine* selected Canyon Lakes as one of "18 of the Best in the Pacific Northwest."

Canyon Lakes is famous for large, fast, undulating greens with the 12th hole touted as the

largest green in the Pacific Northwest at 12,000 square feet. The ninth hole was also awarded as one of the Northwest's Dream 18 holes. With five sets of tees measuring from 5,500 to 7,027 yards, Canyon Lakes will test the mettle of all types of golfers.

• **Highlander Golf Club:** At 800 feet above the Columbia River is a breathtaking piece of property that boasts a masterpiece designed by John Steidel and built by Jim Haley (Haley created and shaped Bandon Dunes). This one is called Highlander and it lives up to the name with magnificent panoramic views. The most talked about hole is the par-3 ninth, a 185-yard bear that requires a tee shot across a canyon.

• **Links at Moses Pointe:** Located just four miles north of interstate 90 in Moses Lake, Wash., it has been a favorite destination for golfers since opening in 1999. Having played host to the 2005 and 2008 Washington State Amateur Championship as well as the 2011 Pacific Northwest Public Links, Moses Pointe will test the games best players. With great golf, 300 plus days of sunshine, and a growing residential golf community, Moses Pointe is sure to become your next home away from home, or who knows, maybe your next home?

• **Gamble Sands:** In Brewster, Wash. is an award winning course. From the championship course to the 37-room Inn at Gamble Sands to the Cascade Putting Course, it is premier facility. The course sits above the Columbia River and the David McLay-Kidd layout is ranked among the best in the country

A new 14-hole golf course called Quick Sands plays differently every day with different routing and yardages on all 14 holes. A putting course sits next to the villas.

• **Sun Lakes Resort:** Sun Lakes Resort in Coulee City, Wash. is a busy place with plenty of recreation option, including Vic Meyers Golf Course. Sun Lakes Resort has a myriad of outdoor activities plus with the terrific weather especially in fall. It's a busy place so get those reservations early for the cabins and RV spaces.

• **Horn Rapids:** Horn Rapids Golf Course, located in Richland, Washington, is a premier golfing destination that offers a beautiful and challenging golf experience. With a par of 72, the course spans over 7,200 yards from the back tees, offering ample opportunities for both power hitters and strategic shot-makers to test their skills.

Local businessman Brad Rew bought the course in late 2019 and has put a lot of money, time, and energy into improving the entire facility.

Wildhorse Resort, Ocean Dunes both are good bets when fall golf arrives

Terrific fall golf in the state of Oregon can be found all over the state - from the coast to the eastern part of the state. Here is a look at Three Rivers Casino and Ocean Dunes on the coast and Wildhorse Resort in Pendleton.

• The Three Rivers Casino stretches over two towns on the Oregon Coast - Florence and Coos Bay. With casinos in both cities, The Three Rivers Casino Resort offers plenty of places to stay and play. The Florence location offers three on-site restaurants and is also the home of the resort's golf course, Ocean Dunes Golf Links. Ocean Dunes is a treat as you play through the trees and the sand dunes of the Oregon Coast. The Coos Bay location opened in 2015 and offers a 15,000 square foot casino floor with over 250 games. A full service restaurant and bar are also available.

• At the base of the Blue Mountains in the town of Pendleton, Oregon you'll find two spectacular golf courses: The Wildhorse Resort Golf Course and the Golf Course at Birch Creek. that also hfeatures18 holes of championship golf, beautiful lakes, long fairways and deep bunkers, all making the perfect mix for challenging play. In face, the resort played host to the LPGA's Epson Tour.

Designed by legendary golf architect, John Steidel, the Wildhorse Resort Golf Course can play long or short with four sets of tees ranging from 5,718 yards at the front to 7,128 yards from the championship tees. The course also plays host to the Oregon Senior Open every year and this year's LPGA Ladies Clasic Aug. 14-20. There is a driving range, practice green, and a newly expanded full service Pro Shop and swing simulator. Pick up on the turn and enjoy delicious breakfast, lunch, or dinner from the new Clubhouse Bar and Grill.

Nestled near the site of a historic encampment of the Cayuse Indians lies a 248-acre golf oasis.

Formally known as Pendleton Country Club, the Golf Course at Birch Creek is now owned by the Confederated Tribes of the Umatilla Indian Reservation and operated by Wildhorse Resort & Casino. Located just seven miles south of town, the par 72 golf course settles gently into rolling wheat fields and is divided by the meandering Birch Creek where golfers can see native fish or roaming deer as you make your drive.

The perfect getaway is waiting for you in Wildhorse Resort and Casino's 10-story Tower Hotelsups, tent and teepee sites, an outdoor pool, and provides quick shuttle transportation to and from the casino.

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Northwest Washington has spectacular fall colors and several top quality courses

There are plenty of areas in the Pacific Northwest that feature changes when it comes to fall golf- but none more so than Northwest Washington. With changing of the colors, the chance for some early snow in the mountains and the availability of tee times, golf is a great fall option:

• **North Bellingham Golf Course:** Opened in 1995 and is a Scottish style links golf course. The openness leaves one exposed to the elements and one's game at the mercy of the wind at times.

The greens are firm and fast, making a balky putter something to leave at home. The well-manicured greens roll true and put a premium on good putting.

The layout offers 12 ponds, making 14 of the holes play with a water hazard and 58 white-sand bunkers. In fact, a two-year bunker project with new sand in all the bunkers throughout the course was completed in 2014. North Bellingham also has plenty of holes which grab your attention early and keep it the rest of the round.

• **Loomis Trail/Silver Reef:** Loomis Trail was ranked as the No. 1 public course in Washington by *Golf Digest* (2005) and was the only Washington state course ranked in the nation's Top 100. Loomis Trail combines the magic of scenic beauty and dry conditions suitable for year-round play.

The course was purchased by the Lummi Nation Indian Tribe and they have made sure the course has stayed true to its opening with great conditions and a layout which is one of the most challenging in the Northwest.

Loomis Trail also is partnered with the Silver Reef Casino Resort and has packages catered to the golfing crowd. There are a variety of quality rooms and the resort has a little something for everyone.

• **McCormick Woods** has been ranked among the top courses for years since opening in 1986. The course is a treat with 18 holes wrapped among the tall firs and cedars. A spacious 24,000

square foot clubhouse offers views of the golf course and events up to 300 people.

• **LakeLand Village** in Allyn offers 27-holes of golf with three distinctly different nines in Generation I, Generation II and Generation III. The popular residential community dates back to 1972 with each nine added as new housing sections opened up. Each course has elevation changes, tall tree-lined fairways and well manicured greens. And there is plenty real estate action around the course as well from homes to town homes.

• **Shuksan Golf Club:** The Shuksan Golf Club in Bellingham, the theme is nature. There are wetlands throughout the golf course and the first bit of water trouble comes into play on the very first hole. And there are new owners as well.

Elevated tees and greens are prominent throughout the layout as the course varies over 100 feet in elevation. Ten Mile Creek meanders throughout the layout and cuts across many of the fairways to keep golfers on guard.

• **Cedars at Dungeness:** The Olympic Mountains deflect the rain clouds around the city of Sequim, making the Cedars at Dungeness one of the driest courses in Western Washington – an average of 13-15 inches of rain per year. With an 18-hole layout measuring over 6,400 yards, Dungeness is protected by sprawling bunkers and narrow approaches to elevated greens.

The signature hole is the par-5 3rd with a series of bunkers in the shape of a Dungeness crab. Even the sand in this hazard is red.

• **Swinomish Golf Links:** The Swinomish Tribe got into the golf business by purchasing Similk Beach Golf Course and turning it into their own Swinomish Golf Links. The course is part of the Swinomish Casino and Lodge, a place with water views, RV parking, restaurants, gambling and more. The golf course is also a good test and the tribe has put money back into the course to give a new look and some solid conditioning.

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When fall is in the air there is lots to like in Pullman with the Cougars and Palouse Ridge Golf Club

When the Palouse Ridge course opened in 2008 it was ranked the No. 2 Best New Public Course in the country by *Golf Digest* and the 7,308-yard layout has been ranked the No. 2 college golf course by *LINKS Magazine* and is ranked No. 5 course in the state by *GolfWeek* magazine. It is certainly on every bucket list of every serious golfer in the Northwest. It has hosted a long list of men's and women's PAC-12 Championships, NCAA regionals and numerous PNGA tournaments. Palouse Ridge has proved it can stand up to the some of the best amateur players in the game.

Early in his career, John Harbottle traveled to the British Isles to study the great courses of Scotland and Ireland. He was inspired by the natural links courses and the way they were formed without the appearance of disturbing Mother Nature. He wanted to create a natural looking course with a links touch and his knowledge of links-style golf and construction enabled him to transform 315 acres of rolling Palouse Hills into an environmentally sensitive masterpiece. Sadly John Harbottle passed away in 2012 while he was working on a course in California. Wanting to preserve his memory, the University has named the 15th hole the Harbottle Hole, a signature hole that is a drivable par 4 and John Harbottle's favorite hole. The short hole can play decidedly different when the wind blows and at only 350 yards it becomes reachable by long hitters when down wind.

Fall in Eastern Washington means a couple of things to certain people: Football games at Martin Stadium to watch the Washington State Cougars (right) and a little time on the golf course at Palouse Ridge (below).

It is certainly on every bucket list of every serious golfer in the Northwest. It has hosted a long list of men's and women's PAC-12 Championships, NCAA regionals and numerous PNGA tournaments. Palouse Ridge has proved it can stand up to the some of the best amateur players in the game.

When searching for a place for some fall golf in the Pacific Northwest, don't forget about places like British Columbia - especially Rossland, B.C.

Redstone Resort in Rossland is the kind of place which offers great scenery and in the fall, the colors really are noticeable. This is a course with its history dating back for years. But Canadian designed Les Furber added plenty of touches and now, Redstone Resort offers everything you would want from alpine golf. From the first tee box you see tall trees, rolling fairways and the nearby mountains. And most holes you feel secluded like you have the course to yourself. And there is always a chance to see local wildlife from the bears to the owls to the deer.

Tucked away amongst the foothills of the Monashee Mountain Range. The rugged terrain covered with chutes, streams, and ravines guarantees a unique landscape on each hole. There are many risk-reward opportunities that make the course appealing to low and high handicappers alike.

As you stand on the first tee, you get an idea of what lies ahead. You can see the fairway, but not the green. It's a great challenge. And it goes on from there. The eighth hole is a par-5 that tightens near the green and features water in front. And when you get to the back, the tee shot on the 10th is an eye opener. With a carry over a ravine to a fairway which doglegs to the left. It is true mountain golf in every sense.

And since Rossland is also a ski town in the winter, the 18th hole plays right into that theme. The elevated tee shot looks like hitting down a ski run before it doglegs left to the green.

If the conditions are just right in the fall or spring there is a chance to hit the slopes at Red Mountain and then play some golf after that. For more see www.redstoneresort.com.

• So you say you are looking for a place that is a tourist destination in the summer, fall and winter

months. A place that offers some warm sunny temperatures in the summer and some winter wonderland in the colder months. Rossland, British Columbia is just that kind of place you might be looking for.

But don't forget about the fall. This is another time that Rossland is a terrific place to visit.

Located just across the U.S.-Canadian border and about two hours north of Spokane, Rossland is a special hamlet. A place that caters to visitors 12 months a year. With its, population of nearly 4,000, Rossland is a place that entertains tourists in every month of the year.

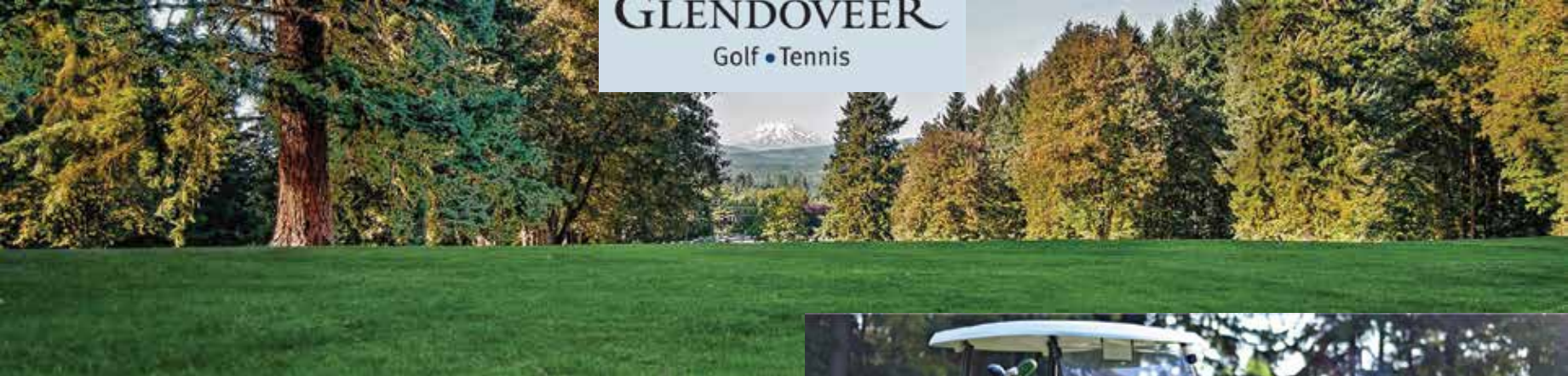
For the summer travelers, Rossland offers a variety of water sports, hiking, golfing, mountain biking and more. And the views of the surrounding Monashee Mountains are always a treat. For those winter enthusiasts, Rossland's Red Resort is one of the biggest ski areas in Canada with its nearly 4,000 acres of skiable terrain and 119 runs. There is plenty to like 12 months out of the year in Rossland.

Rossland's history dates back to the 1800's when the gold rush was bringing in people to look for their riches. And in those days, the nearby Red Mountain was also an attraction, not just for prospecting but for skiing. Olaus Jeldness, who has a statue in the middle of downtown Rossland, is credited with bringing winter sports to Rossland. And now, Red Resort is one of the biggest ski areas in Canada with its nearly 4,000 acres of skiable terrain and 119 runs.

Rossland is also know as the mountain biking capital of Canada. And for good reason. As you make your way around town you either see people on bikes or SUV's with bikes attached to the back. There are miles and miles of trails, including a run called the Seven Summits, a 35-kilometer point-to-point ride.

*** The Wilderness Club:** The Wilderness Club Resort in Eureka, Montana is a haven of enjoyment for families and golf enthusiasts alike. Spanning over 550 acres of picturesque land, this purpose-built resort offers an array of attractions designed to cater to everyone's interests. From championship golf to luxurious accommodations and an exhilarating waterpark, there's something for everyone to savor.

Designed by the esteemed Sir Nick Faldo, the golf course at the Wilderness Club Resort has earned its reputation as the number one course in Montana and one of the top 50 public courses in the country.
