

## **WHAT'S NEW IN NW GOLF**

#### Volunteers are needed for **KPMG Women's PGA event**

One of the LPGA's Major Championships is coming back to the Pacific Northwest this June 20 - 23. Registration is now open for volunteers at the 2024 KPMG Women's PGA Championship, which returns to Sahalee Country Club after previously being held at the Sammamish, Wash. course back in the 2016 golf season.

Sahalee has also hosted other championships including the 1998 PGA Championship, 2002 WGC-NEC Invitational, and the 2010 U.S. Senior Open.

Volunteers play a crucial role in the success of the Championship and get the unique opportunity to be a part of one of the many committees, like Tee Refreshments, Transportation or Leaderboards.

Adult volunteers (ages 23 and up) are required to volunteer for at least three or four shifts (totaling approximately 16-20 hours), and act as a PGA Ambassador, offering assistance to guests during any unscheduled time. Volunteers will pay a \$150 Volunteer Package fee (plus applicable tax & fees), and will receive a volunteer uniform (Nike polo, outerwear piece, and baseball cap), meal vouchers during shifts, official PGA volunteer drawstring bag, complimentary parking, and a personalized Volunteer Credential which will provide access to the grounds all four days of the Championship.

Student volunteers (ages 14-22) are also welcome to volunteer at the Championship on select committees, and have no fee included with their registration.

Question: As a player prepares to take relief for an area marked as ground

under repair in the general area she previews her relief area and notices there are a couple divot holes where her ball could end up after dropping a ball. So



along with removing the loose impediments (leaves, stones, twigs) she replaces the divots in the divot holes and takes her relief under Rule 16.1b. Such a straightforward process but can you see anything of concern? See the answer on Page 2 of this section of Inside Golf Newspaper.

## **PGA Tour Champions, LPGA** and Korn Ferry tours will make their way to the NW in 2024

The professional golf tours are on the way back to the Pacific Northwest - and with a special event for the 2024 golf season.


One of the LPGA's major championships, the KMPG Women's PGA, is set to return to the Pacific Northwest June 20-23 at Sahalee Country Club in Samammish, Wash. The event was last held at Sahalee in 2016 when the tournament was won by a then 18-yearold Brooke Henderson of Canada.

But that's not the only professional golf tournament that Pacific Northwest golf fans will be treated to.

The Portland LPGA Classic has moved dates and will be held Aug. 1-2 at Portland's Columbia Edgewater Country Club. Teenager Chanette Wannasaen won the tournament at 26 under par, becoming the rare Monday qualifier to win the tournament.

The Boeing Classic will bring the PGA Tour Champions to Snoqualmie Ridge Golf Club Aug. 9-11 for its annual three-day run just east of Seattle. Stephen Ames won the tournament by a whopping six shots last year at Snoqualmie Ridge.

Rounding out the professional tours in the Northwest is the Albertsons Boise Open, which is set for Aug. 25-28 at Hillcrest Country Club.

# WM Phoenix Open: The craziness gets even crazier during the 2024 event in the desert



#### Rules Answer

Answer: Under the current Rules of Golf there is a somewhat new defined term referred to as "Conditions Affecting the Stroke." This definition covers 5 items that cannot be improved before a player makes a stroke or drops or places a ball in a relief area. They are (1) area of intended stance (2) area of intended swing (3) the line of play (4) lie of ball at rest (5) relief area where a player will drop or place a ball. Rules 8.1 and 8.1a guide us in supporting the principle of playing the course as you find it by restricting what can be done in these 5 areas. In this situation the player can remove and clean up the loose impediments but they cannot create or eliminate holes, indentations or uneven surfaces by replacing the divots in divot holes. Even removing the divots after replacing them does not eliminate the penalty of 2 strokes the General Penalty.

The PGA Professional Championship presented by Club Car, Corebridge Financial and Rolex takes place Apr. 28 - May 1 at Fields Ranch at PGA Frisco, Frisco, Texas and will include professionals from around the country who qualified for the event and the top players will advance to this year's PGA Championship at Valahalla in Kentucky.

Last fall, Austin Hurt of Wing Point G&CC secured his spot by winning the Section Championship. Also qualifying are: Derek Berg, Corey Prugh, Scott Erdmann, Liam Kendregan, Jeff Coston, Colin Inglis, Russell Grove and Chip Sullivan.

• The Washington Men's Amateur original perpetual trophy, the Kerry Cup, resides in the clubhouse at Seattle

Golf Club, having been won outright by Bon Stein, with his winning the championship in 1922, 1923 and 1925. Stein also won the title in 1926, for good measure. This is similar to the British Open, in which that championship's original



trophy, the Challenge Belt, went home with Young Tom Morris after he won the title for the third year in a row

in 1870. The famed Claret Jug was not introduced as the British Open's perpetual trophy until 1872.

## Golf's popularity continues to soar with some big numbers; Central Oregon area will host pair of amateur tournaments

Perhaps the most pressing question facing the golf industry over the past several years is whether the "pandemic dividend" would last.

There were further encouraging signs in 2023, with increases in participation and play, a healthier balance between the number of golfers and courses, and an evolution of a traditional game that's positively affecting golf demand... and golf's brand.

An estimated 26.6 million Americans played golf on a course in 2023, a net increase of approximately one million golfers. It's the biggest single-year jump in on-course participants since 2001, the year Tiger Woods held all four major titles simultaneously – aka "The Tiger Slam" — which helped spur recreational golf engagement levels to new heights.

In the "Covid era," the game has experienced momentum not seen since that "Tiger Boom," with record or near-record levels of play and high-water marks for beginners and interest among non-golfers. The number of rounds of golf played in 2023 will check in just shy of the all-time high (in 2021) when the December data is released later this month.

It's not just a post-pandemic carryover either. The popularity and increasing availability of off-course forms of golf are introducing more people to the game in different ways, helping not only increase interest in golf but driving record on-course trials and creating a consumer base that's more diverse than ever. Total participation—counting both green-grass and off-course play (like that at Topgolf or in indoor simulators)—climbed to 45 million in 2023, a 9% year-over-year gain and a jump of over 50% in the past decade.

When looking at the nearly 14,000 golf facilities nationwide, rounds per course over the past few years are at their highest levels since the early 1990's, an indication of the better balance between supply and demand.

Golf course closures in 2023 dipped to their lowest levels since prior to the Great Recession. And there were

more new course openings last year than any time since 2010

#### **Central Oregon Shootout at Aspen Lakes**

The 2024 Central Oregon Shootout is set for April 26-27 at Aspen Lakes Golf Course in Sisters, Ore. Entry is \$500 per team and includes a welcome reception. Both rounds will feature 10:00 a.m. shotgun starts at Aspen Lakes.

#### Battle at the Resorts set for May 2-4

Eagle Crest Resort and Black Butte Resort will be the hosts for the Battle at the Resort - a two-person team championship event.

The three formats for the tournament will be a twoperson scramble, Best Ball and Chapman. Eagle Crest's Ridge and Resort courses will hosts tournament rounds as will Black Butte's Glaze Meadow course.

#### **Eaglemont saga continues**

To recap the Eaglemont saga from last month: Two homeowner couples, with the backing of over one hundred other residents, filed a suit against Beacon Hill Ministries, the current owner of the property, claiming that they are required to reactivate the golf course because the original zoning for the community included the golf course.

Beacon Hill Ministries argued that their claim is about zoning and can't be extended to the current ownership of the property.

The judge said that while she granted that it was equitable for the homeowners to require the current owner to maintain the course, that it was not sufficient to overcome the inequity she found toward the owner of the property if the owner was required to spend the large amount of capital to get the course and property restored and operating. She quoted an amount taken from testimony that it could take \$800,000 or more to restore the course, but requiring that of an owner she deemed unfair. A big setback for the home owners.

It appears that Beacon Hill Ministries borrowed \$3 million from Capital Preservation/Romano Capital, a Vancouver, Wash. company in order to purchase the property and failed to repay the loan. So Romano foreclosed and scheduled an auction for the week following the court date. Romano set a minimum bid of \$3.385 million would be required for anyone to purchase the property. The auction was canceled at the last minute and rescheduled for March 1st.

The judge noted that a strong potential buyer testified and said he would bid on it. But, that ignores the fact that it is highly unlikely that this or any buyer would pay anything like the minimum bid set by the lender. Beacon Hill could continue to own it until a successful auction. This means that the property could continue to see further deterioration.

Inside Golf will follow this saga as it unfolds and will have more next month.

#### See if you know the rules

Inside Golf Newspaper always likes to see if golfers know the rules of golf. here is a question to test your knowledge this month:

**Question:** A player in your group hits their tee shot down the left side toward not very good country. In anticipation they may not find the ball they properly announce and play a provisional ball which lands in good shape in the fairway. After a short search they find the ball in a very bad place and declare it unplayable. Neither the "lateral" or "back on the line" option provides relief. They decide to play their provisional ball. Sounds like they made a reasonable decision, right?

Answer: No. Unfortunately Rule 18.3a only provides the use of a provisional ball when your ball might be lost outside a penalty area or out of bounds. It does not offer use of a provisional ball for an unplayable ball. If the options under Rule 19.2b and 19.2c are not viable their only option is to return to the tee and play under stoke and distance. When they played the provisional ball they made a stroke at a "wrong ball" and must correct that error by putting a ball into play from the tee again. The penalty for the wrong ball is the general penalty (two strokes). If they don't correct the error before playing from the tee of the next hole they would be subject to disqualification.

# Pro Golf's Brian Pruitt works his magic with just about any club in your golf bag

If there is something new about golf clubs, it rarely would get past Brian Pruitt. When you have been repairing and building golf clubs for over 30 years, there is not much that gets by you in the golf club business.

Pruitt has been working his magic with golf clubs at Pro Golf in Tacoma for over 30 years. He has seen his fair share of broken clubs and new clubs that might need reshafting or new grips. And with the world of golf every changing with new technology, Pruitt has seen it all.

He has even seen a guy pay \$1,000 for a new shaft. He has even repaired clubs for a guy who broke every iron over his knee after a bad round. Another guy broke three shafts on purpose and was texting Pruitt within minutes saying he needed new shafts. From new grips, to new shafts to new clubheads, Pruitt has fixed or seen just about everything there is to see in the world of golf club repair.

The 57-year-old Pruitt got his start at Tim O'Brien's

Golf Shop and Golfland repairing clubs. He took a job at Pro Golf in Tacoma in 1992 working on the floor selling - not repairing. But he knew that golf repair was his true calling and found his way back into the shop not long after.

Pro Golf was not the complete golf club repair location it is today, starting with grips and not much more. But now all of the Pro Golf shops from Bellingham to Tacoma have club repair shops and all of the repair folks are Mitchell Certified - meaning they are top of the line when it comes to golf club repair.

Since Pro Golf has its own repair shops, the time for golfers to get clubs back is cut down. "That is what makes us successful," said Pruitt. "We can get the work done fast because we have just about everything here.

Has Pruitt every come across anything he couldn't fix? He says the old Ping clubs were virtually welded together and needed to be sent back to Ping to get fixed. Other than that, anything has been fair game when it

comes to club repair or working on anything that has to do with golf clubs.

"What is interesting about golf club repair - and especially getting clubs reshafted is the price. As Pruitt explained - the higher quality the graphite the higher the price. Most golfers are looking for ways to chase distance. And, as Pruitt said, many will pay the price to find a way to add yards and that means more expensive shafts.

As Pruitt looks around his own shop in Tacoma, he sees an endless supply of shafts, clubheads and repair equipment. It has been his world for over 30 years and he takes pride in every club he repairs and every new shaft he puts in.

"It's a great business and it's fun to give people what they want," said Pruitt. "What makes us successful here is that we have just about everything to give clubs back to people when they want them. It's been a great business."

## Company is looking forward to exposing golfers to the world of golfing in Asia

There are plenty of places to tee it up in the United States. But Scott Resch is trying to expose golfers to a different part of the golfing world: Asia. His new company is focusing on a golf destination he believes has more game than any other on earth.

The owner of Asia Golf Trips has walked the fairways of more than 60 courses in Asia, where he lived between 2007-'10 and visited quarterly from 2011-'18 while working for a media relations firm that represented luxury hospitality interests in that part of the world.

But he has also played everywhere from Bandon Dunes, Pebble Beach and the Hawaiian islands to Scotland, South Africa and Australia's Sandbelt. His opinion therefore takes into consideration all the spots most golfers have on their bucket lists.

"I don't dislike any of the places most golfers have on a pedestal," said Resch, a former golf writer and Golf Digest course rater. "But the fact is, none hold a candle to Asia when you acknowledge the entire picture — the golf, the accommodations, the food, and all there is to see and do off the course."

Those seeking proof of the quality of Asia's tourism assets needn't look any further than Asia Golf Trips' website, Resch said. In addition to a page highlighting recent feature stories on the region by renowned media, the resource is packed with images "of the people, places and properties that allow us to provide high-end golf tours that just hit different," he added.

"So many of the courses over there are nothing short of exceptional," Resch said. "In fact, a lot of them look as if they've been airlifted from Scotland or Ireland or Bandon. I'm talking right on the ocean, and designed by some of the biggest names in the game such as (Jack) Nicklaus and (Nick) Faldo and (Greg) Norman. Only there you don't have to worry about how many layers you packed."

The website is also where curious minds can learn why Vietnam is the focal point of Asia Golf Trip's debut season (2024), why winter is the best time of year to go, and what the dates are for the first few trips.

"The beauty of going this season is that the trips that will only go up (in price) from here," said Resch, who will also guide the trips. "It's an incredible deal for a high-end, hassle-free, boutique experience. Everything is five-star and meticulously planned so you can just enjoy what is sure to be the trip of a lifetime."


Resch's understanding of golf in Asia started in

2006, two years after moving to Utah from Seattle. While working as a golf magazine editor for a national publishing group with offices in Park City, he participated in a 10-day press trip to Vietnam.

A year later, Resch joined the agency that put the trip together — and went on to organize and lead dozens of trips for journalists on assignment for outlets ranging from Golf Digest and Conde Nast Traveler to The New York Times and The Sydney Morning Herald.

"That type of job was never on my radar," said Resch, who had only held editorial positions before 2007, including content production gigs with ESPN and Microsoft. "But I'm glad the opportunity came my way. It changed my life."

# Rules of the Game: There is one simple rule to always follow when playing golf, don't be late for your tee time

I'm late, I'm late - for a very important - tee time! Now what? For a casual round of golf, the consequences for being late to your tee time are likely to be different depending upon the buddies you play with, how busy the course is that day, or any specific procedures in place at the course. In tournament play, the consequences of being late to the tee depend on how late you are for your starting time, and the specific circumstances that caused your delay. Or if you're playing partners or course are sticklers for the rules, please see the scenarios below:

First, let's address starting time as defined by the USGA. A starting time is treated as an exact time, for example a 10:17 am starting time means 10:17:00, not anytime until 10:18 am. If you arrive at the starting point (your first tee) at 10:17:01, you're late! Not only do you need to be on time, you must also be ready to play. Ready to play would mean you have a at least one club and one ball ready for immediate use.

If you happen to show up to the teeing area with a putter and a ball, you are welcome to tee off with your putter. I know you have probably had an experience when your starting time has been delayed because of frost, inclement weather, or the group in front of you needs a ruling. In this situation there is no penalty or rule breach if you are present and ready to play when your group can start. If you arrive at your starting point more than 5 minutes late the penalty is disqualification. However, exceptions may apply to the disqualification penalty. Let's consider the following three players each having a rough morning, two will qualify for exceptions under Rule (5.3)


Casey is having a bad morning. His coffee maker broke, and he just can't play a good round of golf without a cup of java. He has a 7:30 am starting time and sees the drive thru line at Starbucks is very

short. He pulls into the line deciding he can make it on time. Casey races to his starting hole ready to play with his latte, a ball, a tee, and his driver at 7:32 am. Casey will be assessed a general penalty for being late for his starting time. Because he was ready to play no more than 5 minutes late, he is not disqualified. But Casey does receive the general penalty applied to his 1st hole. Just a reminder that in stroke play the general penalty is two strokes, while in match play the general penalty is a loss of hole.

Garrett's morning is far from normal. On his way to the golf course a car in front of him went through a stop sign - a fender bender took place right in front

of his eyes. Garrett has extensive first aid training and stops to help. By the time Garrett gets to the course he is 15 minutes late for his starting time. The Committee decides there were exceptional circumstances that prevented Garrett from starting on time, consequently there is no breach of the Rule and no penalty applies. Remember that each case is considered by the Committee and that the determination as to what is considered exceptional circumstances is at the committee's discretion.

Lastly, Tom's morning seems like it's starting out normal, but he is new to the area and doesn't know much of what to expect on his way to the

course. He encounters much heavier traffic than he anticipated. Tom's lack of planning means he arrives ten minutes late for his starting time.


Tom is disqualified for arriving for his starting time more than five minutes late. It is very likely the Committee would not consider lack of planning as an exceptional circumstance and the disqualification penalty applies.

There is one sure way to make sure that you do not receive any penalties for being late for your starting time.

Plan to be at your starting hole at least five minutes prior to your starting time!







## The Lesson Tee: It's time to get practical with your game and change the outcome and direction

Wow! Spring is coming. Great news. Tournament time. More golf for everyone.

Let's do a few purposeful practice enhancements to seriously improve in 2024. Let get practical and change our outcome and direction. It is that time of the year to get things done with your swing heading into the golf season.

I have had Jeff Coston Golf Academy at Semiahmoo for over 30 years. Totally awesome and grateful. Amazing place and people. I have had so much success with swing changes, with drills and "Swing Stations."

Photo 1: This station helps 98/100 golfers. I have placed two driver shafts and a swimming noodle even with my right shoulder and 6 inches to the right. This creates turn and depth to the backswing and eliminates lifting the arms up.

Turn your hips and shoulders under the pole. Do not touch the pole with the shaft, hands or arms on the backswing or downswing. I have had so much success with this station. You can work with this at home without hitting balls or on the range hitting shots. I suggest both.

Also, imagine this station when it isn't there. Ben Hogan imagined a plane of glass on his shoulders and swung the club under the glass not to break it.

Photo 2: This drill and image is an enhancement to photo 1. Turn your hips and shoulders without much weight shift and touch the wall hands shoulder high. This creates 3 dimensional depth on the backswing. Very important.

Turn your hips. Most golfers slide hips or tilt hips rather than turn! Keep weight left as you turn. Less weight shift.




