Westport golf project gets through another hurdle

Westport Golf Links has cleared a hurdle as the group behind the proposed course on the Washington coast gets closer to realizing its dream of a new course.

Thurston County recently ruled in favor of Washington Parks and Westport Golf Links wiping out Friends of Grays Harbor's core contention regarding a supposed standing deed restriction.


The ruling confirms that there is no legal barrier preventing the Washington State Parks from advancing the concession structure and clears the way for the project to continues through the lawful SEPA process, permitting and eventually getting final approvals with the city of Westport.

The next phase the group is working toward is the permit application process where they are dealing with state and local regulators through the SEPA process to identify maximum public benefit through access, recreation and environmental uplift to legally permit the project.

As well as acting as the development group's golf development expert, David McLay Kid was also the in-house golf designer. This role became more of his focus in recent years. David's golf course designs include Bandon Dunes, Gamble Sands, Saint Andrews Links - The Castle Course, Tetherow Golf Course, and TPC Stonebrae Country Club.

Pacific NW golf shows set for the 2026 dates

There is a big change in store for the Seattle Golf Show for the 2026 season. The show is set for a new home as it moves to the Washington State Fair Events Center in Puyallup.

The show is set for a three-day run March 13-15 at the new venue. The show will feature all of the things golfers have come to see and experience including gifts at the front door with a ticket purchase. Plus once inside there will be plenty of interactive things to do inside the new home of the show.

The Portland Golf Show is set for March 6-8 at the Portland Expo Center. The three-day show will feature plenty of action for golfers once they get inside the building and more for just buying a ticket.



Professional tours on the way to the NW in '26 as LPGA Portland and Boeing Classic set dates

The LPGA and PGA Tour Champions have set their dates for their return appearances to the Pacific Northwest for their annual tournaments.

Interestingly both are set for the same weekend in August. The LPGA Portland Standard is set for Aug. 13-16 at Columbia Edgewater Country Club while The Boeing Classic will take place Aug. 14-16 at Snoqualmie Ridge Golf Club. The LPGA Portland Standard is the longest-running tournament on the LPGA Tour schedule.

After a historic 75th anniversary season, the LPGA Tour announces the 2026 schedule featuring 33 events and a total prize fund of over \$132 million. The world's best female golfers will once again compete for the largest prize fund in the Tour's history. The upcoming year will notably see the Solheim Cup in the Netherlands as well as new events, new venues and increased purses. In 2026, the LPGA Tour will travel to 13 different countries and regions and 13 states across the United States. There will be two multi-event swings in Asia – the first in the spring to Thailand, Singapore and the People's Republic of China and the second in the fall to People's Republic of China, the Republic of Korea, Malaysia and Japan. One European swing will take place in the middle of the year, including two major championships and the ISPS Handa Women's Scottish Open, before the LPGA Tour returns to Europe for the Solheim Cup in September.

The Boeing Classic just celebrated its 20th year in 2025 and always features one of the top fields on the PGA Tour Champions schedule.



Rules Answer

Answer: When players decide to leave a flagstick in the hole they must make that decision prior to making the stroke. When a player has left the flagstick in the hole and not authorized anyone (asked) to attend it, another player must not deliberately move or remove the flagstick to affect where the player's ball in motion might come to rest. Since this good Samaritan removed the flagstick to prevent the ball from striking the flagstick they were in breach of Rule 13.2a (4) for which the penalty is 2 strokes the General Penalty.

Northwest's Marcus King joins the PGA of America Board of Directors

No shortage of USGA events in the NW coming up; George Fox women's golf coach joins Hall of Fame

2029: U.S. Girls' Junior - Eugene Country Club.

George Fox coach joins Hall of Fame

The Women's Golf Coaches Association announced the newest members of its WGCA Coaches Hall of Fame, with George Fox University women's golf head coach MaryJo McCloskey joining the list of coaching legends as an inductee.

After launching the women's golf program in 2006, McCloskey has completed 19 seasons as the head women's golf coach at George Fox University, which is located in Newberg, Ore.

She has led the Bruins to 14 consecutive top 10 finishes at the NCAA Championships and captured the program's first-ever NCAA National title in 2023. In her time in Newberg, McCloskey has transformed the women's golf program into a national power – the Bruins have earned a trophy in nine of the past 13 seasons by virtue of finishing in the top four at the NCAA Championship.

"This honor represents the culmination of years of believing – in the process, in the power of culture, and in the idea that we could build something truly special together. I never set out to win awards; I just wanted to help young women discover confidence, resilience, and joy through golf. Seeing how far our players have come, both on and off the course, means more to me

than anything. This award simply reflects that shared legacy."

An eight-time Division III Golf Pride WGCA West Region Coach of the Year, McCloskey has coached two individual NCAA Champions, four PING WGCA Players of the Year, three WGCA Freshman of the Year honorees, 33 WGCA All-Americans, and 28 WGCA All-American Scholar.

Pacific Coast Amateur to Poppy Ridge

The Pacific Coast Golf Association (PCGA) has announced that the 59th Pacific Coast Amateur Championship will take place July 21-24, 2026, at Poppy Ridge Golf Course in Livermore, Calif.

This marks the first time Poppy Ridge – owned and operated by the Northern California Golf Association – will host the Pacific Coast Amateur. Its sister course, Poppy Hills in Pebble Beach, previously hosted the championship in 1996.

It was that year – 1996 – when what is now Poppy Ridge originally opened as a 27-hole facility with three 9-hole layouts. In May 2025, a 13-month total redesign and rebuilding of the course was completed, under the design of Jay Blasi, who had worked right beside Robert Trent Jones II to design Chambers Bay in Washington, which itself has hosted the Pacific Coast Amateur on three occasions (2017, 2021, 2024).

The new Poppy Ridge course offers playability, variety, and flexibility throughout its wide, undulating fairways, making it a prime location to host the top amateur golfers of the world.

The Pacific Coast Amateur and NCGA share deep ties, and the 2026 championship will mark a significant milestone.

Royal Oaks to host PNGA event

In 2026, two Pacific Northwest Golf Association championships will be held at one of the most storied

and coveted golf clubs in the region.

Royal Oaks Country Club in Vancouver, Wash., will host the 41st PNGA Men's Mid-Amateur and 23rd Women's Mid-Amateur championships concurrently from August 18-20, 2026. The scheduling marks the first time Royal Oaks will have hosted a PNGA Mid-Amateur, and the first time since the 2003 Men's Amateur it has hosted any PNGA championship.

Royal Oaks has become well-known across the Northwest through the Royal Oaks Invitational, which has been held yearly in junior, senior and amateur divisions since 1957. It's also been the site of other high-level events such as the Oregon Amateur Championship, Northwest Open Invitational, and PNWPGA Senior Section Championship. The Hudson Cup and USGA Qualifiers have also been held at Royal Oaks.

Prior to 2003, Royal Oaks had also hosted the PNGA Men's Amateur in 1994, when then-18-year-old Tiger Woods claimed victory. It was Woods' first significant title as an adult.

Opened in 1947 after its inception by 50 local businessmen two years prior, Royal Oaks continues to be a member-owned club, with a distinct length and features that have long put championship players to the test. Fred Federspiel is officially credited with the challenging design.

Youth on Course a deal for juniors

Ever since it started, the Youth on Course program has been a boon for kids looking to get into the game of golf. With the price of golf sometimes fairly high, the Youth on Course program has been a way for kids to play a round of golf for \$5 - at a variety of golf courses around the country.

The program is quite popular in the Pacific Northwest as many courses offer the \$5 program for youths looking to play a round of golf. Youth on Course has taken away the barriers of cost for

Inactive posting season continues on in the NW

Inactive score posting season in the Pacific Northwest started in November and runs until March 1, 2026. The NW is one of 41 golf associations in the U.S. that has an inactive posting season during the winter months. This is because of the general change in course conditions in our region that would adversely affect course ratings.

If you play golf during our Inactive Score Posting Season in an area where scores are still being accepted for handicap purposes, you must post those scores as soon as practicable. Your handicap will continue to be revised daily when you post an eligible score, even during the off-season.

Each course is rated under the Course Rating System, part of the World Handicap System. The single largest factor that impacts a course rating is distance. How far a ball will travel in the air, and how much roll it gets on the ground, are heavily impacted by weather. To create a standard course rating, each course is rated as if it is July 4th (or, high summer), and the difference in course conditions in our region between summer and winter are too great and would negatively affect the majority of golfers and their handicap. There are many courses in our region that drain well and stay in good condition for the winter months, but they cannot evaluate this on a course-bycourse basis.



Rules of the Game: Make sure to correct any mistake you made before you tee off or you just might get DQ'd

Welcome to 2026! There are no USGA rules changes to report for 2026 - therefore, let's continue to look at the five situations when a player needs to correct their mistake before they tee off on the next hole to avoid disqualification. We've covered items 1 through 3 listed below and this month's article includes the 4th situation; playing from a Wrong Place.

- 1. Failure to hole out (Rule 3.3c)
- 2. Failure to correct having played from a Wrong Tee, or outside the Teeing Area (Rule 6.1b(2)
- 3. Failure to correct having played a Wrong Ball (Rule 6.3c)
- 4. Failure to correct having played from a Wrong Place with a Serious Breach (Rule 14.7)
- 5. Failure to correct having played in the Wrong order in Foursome Play (Alternate Shot Rule 22.3)

Admittedly, Wrong Place rulings can sometimes be confusing because there are two standards for Wrong Place penalties. The first is when playing from a Wrong Place did not result in a serious breach, and the second is when a serious breach did occur. To differentiate between the two situations, you first need to understand what defines a serious breach, and what constitutes a Wrong Place.

A Wrong Place is any place on the golf course other than where the player is required or allowed to play their ball. Some examples are:

- 1. Playing a ball from in a No Play Zone
- 2. Playing a ball that was dropped outside the required relief area, or playing ball that was dropped inside the relief area, but came to rest outside the relief area
- 3. Playing a ball that was replaced on a wrong spot or playing a ball that a player failed to replace when required by the Rules





4. Playing a ball from a Wrong Green

A serious breach occurs when a player gains a significant advantage over other players by playing from the Wrong Place. At first, this may seem difficult to know as there is no wording in the Rules of Golf that tells players exactly what significant advantage means. In my experience, the advantage gained must be clearly remarkable before the USGA would lean toward labeling a situation as a serious breach. The penalty for playing from a Wrong Place (without a serious breach) in stroke play is two penalty strokes and in match play a loss of hole penalty. For a Wrong Place to be a serious breach, I would ask you to consider if by playing from the Wrong Place, that the player gained more than a two strokes advantage (for stroke play). If your answer is clearly yes, then a Wrong Place serious breach penalty is likely in order. Keep in mind that playing from a Wrong Place in match play is a loss of hole penalty—which pretty much makes a Wrong Place serious breach in match play irrelevant. The player loses the hole as soon as they play from the wrong place, (that seems punishment enough to me) and that hole is over.

Some situations I would consider not be a serious breach would be:



Make sure to correct a mistake before you tee off on your next hole or you might just get disqualified.


Paul moved his ball marker one putter head to the left because his ball marker was in Bill's line of play on the green, But Paul forgot to move it back and played from the new spot. Or, Mike took free relief from an animal hole—measuring two club lengths instead of one which allowed him to drop in the fairway and play his ball from the fairway instead of the first cut of rough. Rusty played her ball from a wrong green (even though she used a putter so she wouldn't damage the green) instead of taking free relief from the Wrong Green.

I would consider the following to be Wrong Place serious breach:

Terry played his tee shot that landed out of bounds instead of returning to the tee under stroke and distance. Ken took two club length lateral relief on the green side of a yellow Penalty Area, instead of going back on the line relief on the fairway side of the yellow penalty area. Lorraine created her own Drop Zone, then dropped and played a ball from her created zone when she couldn't find her ball.

Now that you have a clearer understanding of Wrong Place, and Wrong Place with a serious breach, keep in mind that playing from a Wrong Place without a serious breach means you play out the hole and for your Wrong Place mistake in stroke play, add two penalty strokes to your score. In match play, you've lost the hole as soon as you played from the wrong place.

If you have made a serious breach in stroke play, that error must be corrected prior to teeing off on the next hole, or before turning in your scorecard of the last hole to avoid disqualification.

The Lesson Tee: No need to put those clubs away for the winter, there is time to improve

I know it's winter. I know its cold and wet. I also know, the winter months are a great time to improve our golf game and get ready for the 2026 season.

Whether we work on our ball striking technique; the mental side of golf; our wedge play; pitching; bunker play or putting.

The winter months are a great time to improve and come out flying in the spring. I know it has worked for me and my students. My dry warm academy building sure helps too.

I did a segment on my website a while back with my friend, Tom Lehman, called "5 Questions." Tom is a past British Open Champion and a past PGA Tour Player of the Year. Tom has always been known as a tremendous ball striker.

Tom talks about striking the ball solidly; coming in on a shallow approach to the golf ball; and little rotation of the club face through the hitting area. We are definitely on the same page. Let's focus on solid strikes of the golf ball. Like Tom Lehman, I have seen so much success in my own game and that of my students from swinging on the proper swing plane! Most golfers approach the golf ball on a steep path.

Like Lehman and most successful ball strikers a shallow approach or on plane approach to the golf ball leads to a proper more solid strike! It is also true that with a shallow on plane approach there is less call for over release or rotation of the club head. There is less curve and less timing involved. It is also untrue that a shallow on plane path and approach produces only a draw. Although most golfers would die for a draw.

Secondly, if golfers would have a more stable or centered turn with less weight shift off the ball they would hit more solid strikes of the golf ball. (Rickie Fowler photo 1) When I grew up shifting ones weight was taught to everyone.

Thirdly; here is a revealing and a super drill. Place a piece of plywood 2 1/2 clubheads behind the golf ball.

Paint a line where the ball sits and another line six inches in front of the ball. Make solid strikes without hitting the plywood and create a divot between the two lines. You can also hit shots in this station.

Photo 2 gives you an idea about how it all comes together when all the pieces are in place for the swing.



With two courses to choose from, Glendoveer in Portland is always a great choice to tee it

Glendoveer Golf and Tennis is a hub of fitness and community set in Northeast Portland and is an easy commute from the Portland suburbs or Vancouver, Wash.

The entire property at Glendoveer Golf & Tennis encompasses over 240 acres with golf and tennis as the main attraction of the property. The facility has two 18-hole golf courses and a driving range, plus four indoor tennis courts and event-based footgolf. It also has a popular 2.3-mile fitness trail for joggers and walkers that borders the golf course.

The East Course at Glendoveer plays to 6,295 yards, a par 73 and slope of 123, and is considered the more demanding of the two courses because of its length and tight, tree-lined fairways and bunkers. Water comes into play on three holes.

The West Course opened in 1928 and is one of the oldest in the city. It is a little easier of the two courses at 5,922 yards, and is a par 71 with a slope of 115, it has more open fairways and fewer bunkers. Being relatively flat, it is also easier to

Glendoveer's practice facility includes practice greens and a covered double-decker driving range with 30 hitting spaces. Some offer heated stations for winter practice. Summer camps are available June through August with options for tennis and golf or half-day golf camps. Check their website for exact dates and fees.

Being one of the few facilities in Portland that has 36 holes, groups of up to 288 players can be accommodated on the East and West golf courses. This allows for larger group tournaments. Their recently built outdoor patio area offers a wonderful area to gather afterwards for food and awards.

The other big attraction at Glendoveer is tennis, which includes four indoor courts and all of

the amenities you could want.

It doesn't end there: For the Disc Golf fans, there is a 11,763-foot par 66 course, that held the Portland Classic in 2022. They don't have a full-time disc golf course but host open play throughout the year.


